GEN. GIRAUD VISITS WHITE HOUSE TODAY

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—General Henri Giraud, commander of French forces in North Africa and co-chairman of the French committee for national liberation, will arrive at the White House late today for a conference with President Roosevelt.

The White House announced that Giraud and all the members of his staff accompanying him would see Mr. Roosevelt at 1:30 p. m. PWT. Afterward Giraud and his principal aide and the president and Admiral William D. Leahy, personal chief of staff to Mr. Roosevelt, will have tea at the White House.

Giraud was expected to arrive in mid-afternoon at a nearby airport. The White House twice has emphasized the military nature of the Giraud trip to Washington and has said its purpose is for discussing the conduct of the war with the axis and consultation with the combined Anglo-American chiefs of staff here.

Ways, Means Group To Consider Higher Wartime Tax Bill

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Chairman Doughton (D-N. C.) announced Tuesday the house ways and means committee will begin work September 8 on a new, and higher, wartime tax bill.

The main features of the bill, he said, will not become effective before January 1, 1944. By direction of the committee, Doughton said he had asked the committee staff and the treasury to suggest alternative means of raising additional revenue, with both "specifically instructed to study and report on the feasibility of raising additional revenue by means of an individual excess profits tax."

However, the price of fruits has been increased quite a bit.

Local fruits and berries are not coming in as yet but strawberries are expected soon. Rogue River cherries, apricots, and all kinds of berries are now plentiful at most of the markets.

OPA Checks Cars At Beaches Over Fourth of July

PORTLAND, July 7 (AP)—The OPA intends to find you out if you use more than the 90 miles allotted monthly for pleasure driving. Investigators for the agency reported checking many cars at Oregon beaches over the Fourth of July holidays. License numbers will be checked against those taken previously at resorts.

Other investigators said 223 service stations were found to have violated mileage ration coupon endorsement regulations. Improper coupons equivalent to 23,548 gallons of gasoline were confiscated.

Van Zandt Denies Charging Kaiser

PORTLAND, July 7 (AP)—Denying he ever charged that four Kaiser-built Liberty ships broke up at sea, Rep. James E. Van Zandt (R-Pa.) said after a congressional shipyard hearing here the statement attributed to him was caused by "confusion and misunderstanding."

Newsmen quoted Van Zandt on the charge last week during sessions of a house subcommittee investigating production in yards operating under contract to the maritime commission. Shipbuilder Henry J. Kaiser demanded a public retraction after his son, Edgar, general manager of Kaiser yards in this area, denied the charge before the committee.
