WASHINGTON, July 7 — Full employment has been placed alongside international peace as an equal objective of the British government for the post war world in an official pronouncement by the chancellor of the exchequer, Kingsley Wood.

But in the full employment discussions, both here and in Britain, the talk is of new sensational artificial methods of achieving this result. A \$25,000,000,000 annual federal budget to finance public works, a 20-hour work week (yes 20) and various other devices.

Break Shackles ANY government wants to provide full employment in the future, it first must free itself from these unsuccessful grooves of thought, break out of these reactionary shackles of the mind, and search for valid ways and means that seem likely to do the job.

Newell Military Holds "Open House" On Fourth of July

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Production of planes and naval vessels reached new highs in May, the war production board's monthly report showed today, but the over-all output of munitions remained unchanged from April.

Of the four major programs, merchant ships led in the first six months of the year, with 44 per cent of the 1943 goal achieved. Army ordnance and the output of naval vessels and equipment were estimated at 40 per cent of the 1943 goals, and aircraft 35 per cent.
