

ATTENDANCE RALLY SERIES AT NAZARENES

The second of the series of every-Sunday attendance rallies covering the months of July and August at the Church of the Nazarene church school, will be held at 9:45 a. m. Sunday, July 11.

The school is divided into two sides, using the over-all military challenge. "Unconditional surrender." FAIRHAVEN STARTS 4-H CANNING CLUB

New this year for 4-H club members is the Mother-Daughter canning club, in which the mother and the daughter each do half of the work in canning, rather than the 4-H club member doing all the work herself as was the requirement in previous years.

First club in this vicinity to be organized after the new program was instituted is a club at Fairhaven, led by Mrs. O. M. Chandler and Mrs. O. B. Mikkelsen. Norma Chandler is president of the club.

Minimum requirements for the club include helping put up 50 quarts of fruit, two different varieties, and exhibit one of each variety at the garden and canning show. Other divisions in the club include putting up fruits, vegetables, canning meats and pickles, and drying and freezing foods, as well as preparing them for storage.

Canners will have an opportunity to exhibit their work and to compete for awards at the annual gardening and canning show to be held August 27 and 28.

Club members may also enter the Kerr company 4-H club canning contest. County winners in this will receive a gold plated sterling silver medal, state winners will get a trip to Chicago, and national winners a \$200 college scholarship.

Wright Pleads Innocent to Paid Jap Agent Charge

NEW YORK, July 9 (AP)—Frederick Helzer Wright, 40-year-old copy editor of the New York Daily News, pleaded innocent in federal court today to an indictment charging he served as a paid agent of the Japanese government for 10 years prior to Pearl Harbor without notifying the state department.

Judge John W. Clancy fixed \$5000 bail and set the case down for trial August 9. Wright surrendered voluntarily today.

Erwin Wissenback Now Stationed at Salt Lake City

Erwin Wissenback, young son of Mr. and Mrs. James Wissenback of Shady Pine, who held the title of being the first non-commissioned officer to escape from Occupied Europe after his Flying Fortress was shot down in a raid October 9, 1942, has been transferred to the air corps and stationed at Salt Lake City air base.

Erwin held the title of technical sergeant in the air corps, but now aspires to fly his own plane and knock a few Jerries out of the sky as he did before his bomber crashed on European soil. Erwin was a member of the Clay Pigeon squadron which flew from England.

Canner Prices of Vegetables Upheld

WASHINGTON, July 9 (AP)—Canner prices of the 1943 pack of 10 major vegetable products will be supported at 95 per cent of canners' net ceiling prices, the war food administration has announced.

The support program is designed, the WFA said, to eliminate risks that otherwise might prevent maximum production of canned vegetables this summer.

RESERVATION FOREST LAND TO BE CLOSED

Forested areas of the Klamath Indian reservation will be closed to entry for the duration of the fire season beginning July 1 and ending sometime in the fall, probably October or November, according to B. G. Courtright, superintendent of Klamath Agency forestry division of the U. S. Indian service. Exceptions are as follows:

Principal through roads on the reservation do not require a permit to travel.

Persons having timber or grazing contracts or bona fide business in closed areas may obtain permits to enter the particular unit involving their employment or business.

Permits will not be granted for recreational purposes.

Logging camp employees may obtain their permits from their company timekeeper. Traveling salesmen may obtain permits from logging camp timekeepers provided they have business with the company. Permittees with cars are required to carry a shovel at all times.

Permits will also be issued from the following stations:

Beatty: Ogden E. Brooks, 6 p. m. to 7 p. m., except Saturdays.

Sprague River: R. C. Moore, 6 p. m. to 7 p. m.

Klamath Agency 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

She keeps house for a family of three and her husband works in a logging camp. She cooks one day a week in a restaurant. She prepared the ground, planted, and takes care of about one-half acre of Victory garden. With all this to do, she has found time to knit 39 pairs of gloves, two turtle-neck sweaters, one pair knee bands and 1 navy watch cap. Surely, if one woman can do this, others can find time to help fill our quota of sewing and knitting.

This work can be done at home in odd moments and you will be surprised how much you can accomplish in these odd moments.

You Red Cross Juniors will be proud to know that your work has contributed to the comfort of the first wounded men to arrive from Attu, nearly 400 of whom are now being cared for at Letterman General hospital in San Francisco.

An emergency call for 300 bedroom slippers was received at Pacific Area Red Cross headquarters the day after their arrival and immediately filled. The emergency supply had been produced in thirteen different Red Cross chapters by boys and girls in school.

Fashioned of carpet remnants and quilted padding, the slippers are made entirely by hand for use in hospitals. They were made by Red Cross Junior units scattered throughout California, Oregon, Nevada, Idaho and Washington.

CHICAGO, July 9 (AP)—Fire department officials today said that three firemen were dead and three others were believed to have lost their lives when the roof and front wall of the top floor of a burning four-story building, weakened by a previous fire, caved in, trapping nine firemen under tons of debris.

Fire Marshal Michael J. Corriegan said the three firemen still alive, but in weakened condition, were pinned under tons of debris on a first floor stairway.

EXAMS TO BE HELD FOR U.S. NAVY ACADEMY

Competitive examinations will be held early this fall for applicants who wish to enter the U. S. naval academy at Annapolis, Maryland, according to Congressman Lowell Stockman, who reports a vacancy to be filled from this district for the class beginning July 1, 1944.

Candidates must be at least 17 years of age and not more than 21, and should be high school seniors, or graduates, or college students. Examinations will be held by the civil service commission. Applicants must be legal residents of the second congressional district of Oregon and in perfect physical condition.

The next regular vacancy for the second district at the U. S. military academy at West Point, New York, is due to occur in 1946.

All boys who are interested and qualified should write to Congressman Lowell Stockman, 407 House Office Building, Washington, D. C., immediately so that they may receive additional information and be admitted to the examination.

FORT KLAMATH WOMAN DIES AT 95 YEARS

FORT KLAMATH—E. D. Briscoe received word Tuesday of the death of his mother, Mrs. Dacia A. Briscoe, who passed away Tuesday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ella Matlick, of Bishop, Calif., following a week's illness. Another daughter, Mrs. Mattie Birch, of Klamath Falls, was in Bishop with her mother during her last illness and at the time of her death. Funeral services were held in Bishop Thursday, July 8, at 2 p. m., with interment in the family plot there.

At the time of her passing, Mrs. Briscoe was 95 years of age, having celebrated her 95th birthday on March 6 of this year. In spite of her advanced age, she was very active physically and retained her mental faculties until nearly the last, possessing a remarkably clear memory of events of her lifetime. She remembered particularly many incidents of interest during the Civil war period, and enjoyed relating them. Mrs. Briscoe was well-known in Fort Klamath, where she had visited several times at the E. D. Briscoe home.
