# YOUNGSTERS TO GET SWIM PRIVILEGES

Five and six-year-olds will have the privilege of swimming instruction at the Butler pool, recently purchased by the city, it was announced Friday by Dave Bridge, city recreational officer. Days set aside for these small fry non-swimmers is Monday, Wednesday and Friday of next week, hours from 10 to 11 a. m. and 3 to 4 p. m. Cost is 5 cents per hour. This includes instruction.

Up to today's decision, the age limit was from seven years up through high school, but Bridge felt that provision should be made for the five and six-year-olds. A new schedule of swimming classes will appear in Saturday's paper and all interested are asked to watch The Herald and News.

Parents may bring their little ones to the tank, Bridge advised, but they may not observe the instruction period as spectators were found to detract from the work of those in charge. Children may swim one hour a day, either morning or afternoon but not both.

Since the swimming pool was acquired by the city school system, an increase of 173 boys and girls was noted on the recreation program books. This brings the enrollment up to a new high of 693 children, Bridge said.

## UTAH COPPER MOVES AS STRIKE SETTLED

BINGHAM CANYON, Utah, July 9 (AP)—Heavily laden ore trains moved from the huge pits of the Utah Copper company mines to smelters today as operations again reached a peak after temporary settlement of a strike of railway conductors. In less than an hour after the 100 conductors of the Bingham and Garfield railroad last night voted to return to work, operations at the pits and the nearby Magna and Arthur smelters resumed.

The trainmen, members of the Order of Railway Conductors (AFL) walked off the job Tuesday, depriving the mines of transportation for the ore to smelters.

July 31—Expiration date of red stamps P, Q, R and S. Stamps valid as follows:

August 7—Blue stamps N, P and Q for processed foods expire.

**SUGAR**  
August 15—Stamp No. 13, good for five pounds, expires at midnight.

October 31—Stamps number 15 and 16, good for 5 pounds of sugar each for home canning purposes only, expire.

**COFFEE**  
July 21—Stamp No. 21, war ration book No. 1 of book holders 14 years of age or over, good for 1 pound of coffee, expires at midnight.

**GASOLINE**  
July 21—No. 6 stamps, in "A" book, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

**SHOES**  
October 31—Stamp No. 18, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

## More Speeders Appear Before War Ration Board

Two additional motorists who have ignored the 35-mile pace set during war time, appeared late Thursday before the war price and rationing board.

These motorists, as well as those who appeared last Thursday, were checked after they had crossed the California line, it is understood, and their license numbers provided by California police or by Oregon police elsewhere in the state. Said Sergeant E. W. Tichenor of Oregon state police:

"Members of the California highway patrol are clocking drivers over a three-mile course, but that method is not applied by Oregon state police as we have a law which prohibits the use of 'speed traps.' Our orders are, however, to observe traffic and if anyone is seen traveling at an excessive speed, we are to follow them for a designated distance to ascertain their speed and if it is in excess of 35 miles per hour, we are to fill out a card and forward that card to the rationing board, designating the place where the violation occurred, the speed, make of car, license number, day and time. The speed, must of course, be in

excess of 35 miles before a card is made out."  
Tichenor also said that the state department has no two-way radio cars in this area and previous arrests have not been made by his men. The fact that reports were turned in by California police against Oregon motorists was made clear today by both officers and the rationing board.

## ODT Representative To Be Here Friday

A representative of the office of defense transportation will be here Friday and Saturday of each week at the war price and rationing board.

The representative will be there during regular office hours of the board, and will be sent over from Medford. It is expected that C. C. Proctor, who formerly had the office here, will be the representative.

## Nazis Drop Bombs In Daylight Raid

LONDON, July 9 (AP)—German raiders dropped high explosives on a town in southeast England and a southeast coast resort today while others gave London its first daylight alert since June 27.

The London-bound raiders were headed off short of the metropolitan area, the British reported. The London all-clear came 18 minutes after the warning. The alert was London's 650th of the war.
