

SHAKY OPENING STEADIES TO CHART HIGHS

NEW YORK, July 9 (AP)—Rallying rails provided specialized buying incentives for other sections of today's stock market and favorites rose fractions to a point or more, a number to new highs for the year or longer.

Trends were shaky at the opening but a revived appetite for the lately apathetic carriers turned the tide by mid-day.

Transfers exceeded 1,000,000 shares for the first time in a week.

Profit taking and the trimming of commitments for the week-end served to keep the advance within bounds and put many pivots in the minus column.

Lumber Mill Blaze At Dallas Costs \$50,000 Damage

SALEM, July 9 (AP)—Officials of the Fern Lumber company estimated today at \$50,000 the loss from fire which destroyed its mill six miles from Dallas on the Falls City highway early yesterday.

The fire broke out about midnight and quickly swept through all the buildings despite efforts of Dallas city firemen and Camp Adair soldiers. Origin of the blaze has not been determined.

Western Pine Shipments Steady

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9 (AP)—Production and shipments continued at the approximate pace they set the previous week but were slightly under the figures for the same week last year, the Western Pine association reported today for the week ending July 3. Figures: production 66,250,000 board feet, 68,755,000 previous week, 66,437,000 same week of 1942. Shipments 63,971,000 board feet, 62,083,000 and 68,630,000. Orders—73,632,000 board feet, 56,656,000 and 72,286,000.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 9 (AP)—Selling pressure initiated by failure of anti-subsidy and corn ceiling revision legislation to pass congress brought about fairly substantial declines in all grains today. Trading was heavy at the start but dwindled as the session continued with no sustained rallying power displayed.

Wheat dropped 2 cents and oats a cent before encountering support. With congress recessing, traders were pessimistic about the possibility of higher prices. Renewed selling developed before the close and final prices were generally at the day's lows with wheat off 2-2 1/2, July \$1.45,
