

# Victory-Minded Tigers Grab for Yanks' Place

**Bengals But Two Games Behind New York Men; Could Take Lead This Week**

The Detroit Tigers, in a drive reminiscent of their surge to the 1940 pennant, may oust the New York Yankees from first place in the American league this week-end.

Victorious in 11 of their last 13 starts the aroused Bengals have zoomed upwards from the second division into second place only two games behind the pace-setting Yanks. With the New Yorkers and the third place Chicago White Sox listed to slug it out in successive doubleheaders today and tomorrow, the Tigers could take over the lead by sweeping the three game series with the last place Philadelphia Athletics even if the Yanks win one.

The Tigers already have beaten the A's twice, their latest conquest over Connie Mack's hirelings being a 4 to 0 shutout last night. Hal White twirled a four-hitter, permitting only two Mackmen to pass first. Rookie Dick Wakefield became the first major leaguer to reach the 100-hit mark with a second inning single.

In the National league, meantime, Mort Cooper of the first place St. Louis Cardinals set down the Boston Braves with three singles for a 7-0 shutout. Brooklyn staved off Pittsburgh's challenge for second place by coming from behind twice to beat the Pirates, 8 to 7.

A squeeze play brought Washington a 1 to 0 13-inning triumph over Cleveland after Dutch Leonard and Jim Bagby hooked up in a scoreless pitching duel for 12 innings. Bob Johnson walked to start the 13th, raced to third on Alex Kampouris' single, and scored on Gerald Priddy's bunt along the first base line.

Manager Joe Cronin again socked a homer as a pinchhitter but his effort went for naught when Mike Chartak connected for a ninth inning homer to give the St. Louis Browns a 5 to 4 win over the Boston Red Sox.

Ernie Lombardi, husky Gian catcher, went on a rampage at the Polo Grounds, hitting fouls and a homer in five times at bat. All his effort accomplished, however, was to force the Chicago Cubs to go 12 innings before winning, 5 to 3, on Bill Nicholson's triple.

Cincinnati whacked out 6 runs in a big sixth inning to come from behind and beat the Phillies, 11 to 4.

# Weekend Fishing Prospects

PORTLAND, July 10 (AP)—The state game commission's weekly fishing bulletin indicated Oregon anglers will find conditions ranging from fair to good this week-end.

Reports by counties:

Columbia—Trout angling still should be fair in the Nehalem river, with spinners and bait most effective.

Polk—Streams becoming quite low and clear. The little Luckiamute is fair.

Marion—The Santiam is improving steadily with good catches being made in flies. High lakes producing some good catches.

Lane—Good fly fishing reported in Willamette river above Oakridge and in south fork of the McKenzie. Blue river fair. Lakes good.

Tillamook—Some bluebacks have been taken from Nehalem river and a big run is expected within next two weeks.

Lincoln-Siletz river producing some bluebacks. All streams are moderately low and very clear. Fly fishing is expected to improve.

Curry—Few catches of cutthroat trout reported.

Josephine—Larger streams yielding good trout catches. Limits have been taken with flies on the Rogue.

Jackson—Rogue river fair for trout.

Crook—Streams in Big Summit district fair.

Jefferson—Metolius, Crooked and Deschutes rivers fair.

Klamath—Many limit bags on troll have been taken in Upper Klamath and Agency lakes. North and south forks of the Sprague yielding limit catches on eggs and worm bait. Seven Mile and Wood rivers also good.

Malheur—Owyhee river providing good catches. Limits of silversides and rainbows have been taken at Beulah dam on spinners and worms.

Wasco—Bait angling is best because of high water.

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# Sid Harman Points Way For Golfers

Walla Walla Amateur Leads Peck as Utah's Open Goes Into Second Day's Play

SALT LAKE CITY, July 10 (AP)—He's never won a title although he often has been runner-up in Utah's annual open golf tournament but Sid Harman of Walla Walla, Wash., was at the top of the heap as the 1943 renewal headed into the second round today.

Harman, who has competed in every one of the Utah open tournaments since the inaugural in 1926, shot a three-under par 69 yesterday to gain a three-point lead over the field.

In a second place tie were Lloyd Mangrum of Los Angeles, Ryder cup player, and the top amateur, Lt. W. H. Zylstra of Pocatello, Ida., formerly of Grand Rapids, Mich., where he was captain of the Michigan State college golf team. Each had an even par 72.

Another amateur, Capt. R. W. Knutson of Fort Douglas, U. S., was in fourth, with 73.

Harman did 11 holes of the Salt Lake Country club's 6305-yard course in regulation figures, fired five birdies and was one over par on two holes. His approach shots consistently put the ball close to the cup and he had little difficulty with his putts.

He was out in 34, one under par, and made the return trip in 35, two under par.

# Field Tees Off In Seattle for State Crown

SEATTLE, July 10 (AP)—A field of 160 will tee off today over the Rainier club golf course in quest of Harry Givan's state amateur crown.

Service men, led by Chief Petty Officer Scotty Campbell, are expected to provide some of the brighter spots and stiffest competition in the two-day, 54-hole medal tournament.

The first foursome will get away at 9 a. m. with the last contestants in the big field not scheduled to start until 9 p. m.

A \$750 war bond and a gold medal will go to the tournament winner.

# Ortiz Winding Up Training for Robleto Bout

SEATTLE, July 10 (AP)—Little Manuel Ortiz, king of the bantamweights, will wind up his brisk training today for the defense of his world title against Joe Robleto of Pasadena here Monday night. The two aggressive mitt slingers will meet in a 15-round bout, Seattle's first title fight since Al Hostak lost his middleweight title here three years ago.

The war boom city has been without boxing for more than a year, and the title fight will be the first under the management of the new Rainier Athletic club, which is headed by Bill Mulligan, business manager of the Seattle Rainier baseball organization.
