Leo "Lippy" Durocher apparently is on the way out as manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers as the aftermath of the revolt against his leadership that started the baseball world Saturday.

While on-the-surface peace reigned today in this latest Ebbets field episode, involving the three-day suspension of Star Pitcher Bobo Newsum for what Durocher termed "insubordination," the sentiment of the players was reliably reported to be that they are "sick of being second guessed."

These developments overshadowed yesterday's furious action on the diamond that saw the St. Louis Cardinals and the New York Yankees sweep double-headers from the Boston Braves and Chicago White Sox to widen their leads to 5½ and 4½ games, respectively.

The onrushing Cardinals chalked up their sixth in a row and their 13th triumph in 15 starts as Harry Gumbert blanked the Braves, 3 to 0, on six hits in the first game and White Kuroski doubled with the bases full in the 11th inning for a 9 to 6 conquest in the nightcap.

Spud Chandler won his 10th game for New York with a six-hit 9 to 0 shutout in the opener. In the nightcap the Yanks took a 6-0 lead, blew it when the Sox scored six in the seventh inning, then won out, 8 to 6, in the ninth on Rookie Bud Metheny's first homer of the season.

Milo Candini suffered his first defeat on eight starts for Washington when Cleveland knocked

him out in the first inning and went on to a 5 to 1 victory behind Al Smith's five-hit twirling. The Senators, however, gained a split for the day by winning the second game, 6 to 4, in 10 innings.

Detroit and the Philadelphia Athletics also split a twin bill. Rookie Don Black of the A's beat the Tigers, 4 to 3, in the opener. The veteran Tommy Bridges twirled a brilliant three-hit shutout to gain a 9-0 triumph for the Tigers in the nightcap.

Behind the seven-hit pitching of Bucky Walters and Ray Starr, Cincinnati beat the slumping Phillies twice, 7 to 4 and 14 to 2.

The St. Louis Browns took both ends of their bargain bill from the Boston Red Sox, the first 8 to 7, in 12 innings and the afterpiece, 4 to 2.

The Chicago Cubs and New York Giants divided their second successive doubleheader. Ernie Lombardi's 10th inning homer won the first for the Giants, 4 to 3. Bill Nicholson's seventh inning homer with one on gave the Cubs the second by the same score.

Aided by Bob Elliott's sixth inning triple that scored the tying and winning run, Max Butecher, Pittsburgh right hander, beat Brooklyn for the first time, 3 to 2. The Dodgers came back to win the nightcap, 5 to 4.

Arky Vaughan, third baseman who asserted that Newsum's suspension was unjust and turned in his uniform Saturday, then re-entertained after a conference with President Branch Rickey, played in both games, getting three hits in seven times at bat.

All-Stars Drop Pelicans For 13 to 12 Loss Sunday

The WRA All-Stars from Camp Newell handed the Pelicans a 13 to 12 defeat at Recreation park Sunday afternoon. The visitors got to Bellotti for three runs in the first and added four more in the second inning before Bart Goldbar took the mound. SRO Sign Being Polished Off For It Looks Like a Sell Out for 32,480 Seats

PHILADELPHIA, July 12 (AP)

A crystal ball has never been found in a major league meeting, but the moguls must have had at least a swami or a ouija board handy when they decided, six months ago, to put the All-Star game in Philadelphia this year.

It was at their winter powwow that the club owners sent the Inter-league lawn party to this city of brotherly love, although technically the game wasn't slated for the east this year. It comes off tomorrow in Shibe park, and it's probably the luckiest decision the moguls have made since pop bottles were barred for throwing purposes at umpires.

For when the Nationals and the Americans start shooting at 9 p. m. (EWT), it looks as if every one of the 32,480 seats in Connie Mack's castle on Lehigh avenue will be full of customers and the SRO sign will be out. All but 2000 of the ducks were gone this morning and the folding money was still coming in.

The flight of the "Phantastic" Phillies and the surge of the Athletics, brief as it was, have brought the fans out like a combination bank night and free dishes.

As for the game itself, early arrivals were giving the National league bandwagon a real hand-ride, pointing out that the senior circuit was sporting more pitching and, what is even rarer, more power. Still, the betting commissioners have installed the American leaguers 5 to 6 favorites to make it eight out of 11 in these shindigs.

Ramirez May Waltz 15 or More Tonight

PORTLAND, July 12 (AP)—Roldolfo Ramirez of Mexico City and Jimmy Garrison of Kansas City will go 15 rounds or less tonight in a bout billed for the Pacific Coast welterweight championship.

Ramirez, heralded as Mexico's ace batter of his weight, appeared a slight underdog in the betting. Odds of 8 to 5 favored Garrison, a popular performer here, this morning.

The fight will be the first out doors of the current season and the first in Oregon since 1903 scheduled for 15 rounds. The semi-windup books Joe Kahut of Woodburn and young Otto, a former Golden Gloves batter in Illinois, for a 10-round. This scrap is billed as one to settle the Oregon middle-weight championship.

Ducks Win Eight Games In Sacramento Series

Seattle Climbs From Seventh to Fifth By Battering San Diego Five to Two

The standout in Pacific Coast league baseball is the resurgence of the two Pacific northwest clubs. Portland won eight games in a 10-frame series from Sacramento ending yesterday and climbed into third place ahead of San Diego while Seattle put on a really amazing climb for this late in the season rising from seventh-place to fifth in the week, passing both Oakland and Hollywood.

Portland made its move into third place Friday and held firm on to it by winning three of four weekend games from the Solons. The Beavers won yesterday's opener 4 to 0 behind Ad Liska's six-hit pitching and dropped the seven-inning nightcap as Bud Byerly of Sacramento put on one of the league's better twirling performances allowing only three safe bowls. Portland won both Saturday games 8-3 and 11-4.

The Seattle Rainiers clubbed San Diego five games to two for the week but split the final doubleheader. The Padres took the opener 3 to 2 but Joe Demoran was hot in the nightcap equaling Byerly's three-hitter and Bill Matheson clouted six hits including a home run to give the northerners the game 4-1. Seattle won Saturday 3-0.

However, neither northwest team frightened league leading Los Angeles which continued to edge forward at the front of the standings. Setting up the best series percentage of any of the clubs by taking six games to one from collapsing Oakland. The Oaks won in seventh place when their lone game yesterday, 3 to 1 in a seven-inning nightcap after dropping the first of a twin bill, 7 to 4. The Angels won Saturday 13-6.

Umbinetti Grabs Golf Title Sunday

Seattle Man Lops Ten off Par to Win Washington's Wartime Amateur Match

SEATTLE, July 12 (AP)—Lopping 10 strokes off par over his home course, the Rainier club, Harry Umbinetti of Seattle yesterday captured the wartime Washington state amateur golf championship.

The competition this year was 54 holes of medal play in place of the usual match play, and Umbinetti scored a remarkable total of 20. He shot a four under par 68 Saturday in the first 18-hole round and yesterday put together a 68-70 over the final 36 holes.

Four other sharpshooters also bettered par figures. Chief Petty Officer Scotty Campbell and Erv Parent, both Seattle, tied for the runner-up spot with 21½ five under par, while two Tacoma contestants—Southpaw Jack Walters and Dub Lehman, followed with 21½ to 215 respectively.

Campbell, former Canadian and northwest amateur champion, shot the last 18 holes in a sizzling 68.

Harry Givan, Seattle, defending champion, tied with Chuck Hunter, Tacoma, with 219.

Jack Phillips of Olympia gave the gallery something to look at when he shot a hole-in-one on the 115-yard 15th hole.

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The Army-Navy game, annual super-spectacle of the college football season which was whittled down to small-town size last year, stands a good chance of being whittled down this year to no game at all.

Harman, Schneiter Fight For Utah Open Golf Title

SALT LAKE CITY, July 12 (AP)—Professionals Sid Harman of Walla Walla, Wash., and George Schneiter of Salt Lake City tee off this afternoon in an extra 18-hole playoff for the Utah open golf championship.

Harman and Schneiter ended the 72-hole fairway marathon in a dead heat with scores of 285. It was the first time since 1938 that the Utah open has been forced into a playoff.

In a dramatic finish Harman made brilliant recovery from a shot that hooked into the canyon on the final hole. He blasted out and to the edge of the green

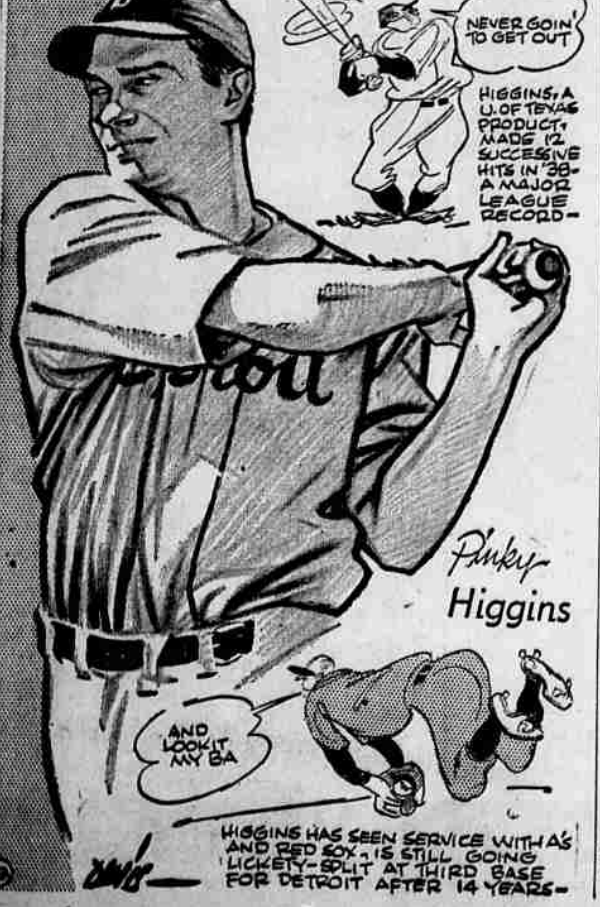
where he sank a 20-foot putt to tie Schneiter.

On the same green Schneiter missed a six-foot birdie putt that cost him a clear-cut win. He had a card of 68 on his first 18 holes and 71 on this afternoon round yesterday to total a three-under-par 285. Harman turned in a 70 and a 72 yesterday.

First place pays \$350, second \$200 and the balance of \$1000 was split among other place winners. \$200 in war bonds went to the amateurs.

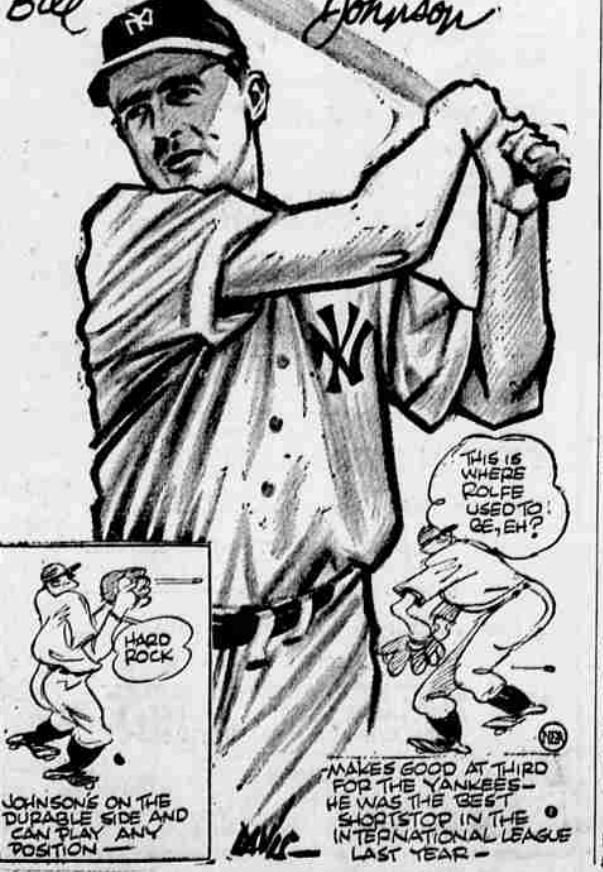
