

LEDERER RESIGNS TULELAKE POST

TULELAKE — The resignation of Charles Lederer, Alturas, who since 1937, when the town was incorporated, has guided city fathers through the maze of technicalities surrounding the incorporation, installation of the city water and sewer systems and floating of the original bond issue, was accepted Monday night by the city council meeting in regular session.

Lederer, who made frequent trips here to sit with the council on all important problems, is serving as district attorney of Modoc and offered as his reason for resigning, pressure of personal business.

No mention of his successor was made during the session.

The columns were previously placed so close together that it was impossible for the helpers in a train to take water without having to disconnect the helpers from the train and one at a time take water.

Lloyd Klinger and a gang of seven men have charge of this work. It is expected the work will be completed by August 1.

Martin E. Moyer and gang will be in Crescent Lake soon where extensive signal work is to be done. Two signals of searchlight type will be installed at the east end of the passenger siding. This will permit east bound trains to proceed to the depot while a west bound train is taking the siding at the other end.

Moyer will also do line work and install new switches at Odell lake and Cascade Summit. It will take approximately a month to complete this work.
