LOW PRICE CLOTHING MAY AVERT RATION

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—Mass production of low priced clothing is the war production board's formula for averting the threat of textile rationing. Chairman Donald M. Nelson declared today that WPB proposes to reverse what he called a growing wartime tendency toward concentrating on the manufacture of expensive fabrics and to give the priorities "right of way" to garments and dry goods of the most-needed kind. "We need not have clothes rationing in the United States," Nelson said. "There is an adequate supply of textiles and textile products to meet all military and essential civilian needs. The major problem is to see that the proper distribution and use is made."
