

POSTWAR ROAD EXPENDITURES \$300,000,000

GRANTS PASS, July 15 (AP) Oregon's highway commissioners, anticipating some \$300,000,000 in postwar projects involving counties alone, started their inspection tour of the Pacific highway today.

They planned to go to the California boundary, confer with Jackson county officials, return here and continue on to Roseburg for a night session with Douglas county officials.

"It now appears that postwar projects involving the counties will exceed \$300,000,000," Chairman T. H. Banfield said as the commission concluded its Coast highway tour. "And this amount does not include some overall state projects which have been under consideration for some time."

One project he mentioned specifically was the proposed Otter Crest relocation on the coast route, estimated to cost more than \$2,000,000.

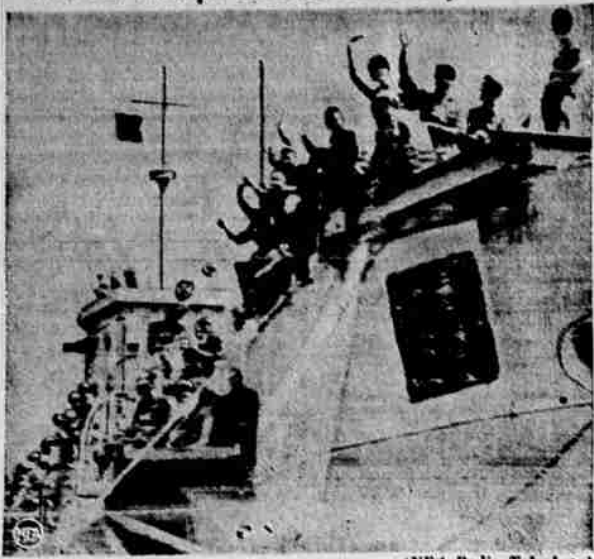
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Allied Troops Leave for Sicily Assault

Maneuver Area Closure Bars Good Hunting Land

BEND, July 15 (AP)—Central Oregon sportsmen pointed out today that the hunting closure ordered by the state game commission at the army's request will include 10,000 square miles of famous deer and waterfowl hunting country. Fishing will not be barred.

The closure was ordered because of army maneuvers to take place in the region.

Included in the closed area will be the Snow mountain country of the Ochoco national forest, famed for its deer hunting, and the Maury mountain region, also adjacent to the Ochoco woods. Near Bend the deer country bordering the Paulina game refuge will be closed, as

will the Walker mountain region in the southern Deschutes woods of northern Klamath county.

Other noted hunting regions affected: Summer lake—mecca for Oregon waterfowl hunters, and most of the wooded country in the eastern Cascades. However, the antelope country is not much affected since most of the pronghorn range lies outside of the maneuver grounds.

Other than Snow and Maury mountain areas, most of the Ochoco forest will remain open and the Paisley district will not be affected. The Steens mountains are outside the army region.

The closure has been styled the most extensive in Oregon's history.

OSS EMPLOYE KILLS STENOGRAPHER, SELF

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP) The coroner listed as murder and suicide today the deaths of William Knox Chandler, 42, employed in the office of strategic services (OSS), and Rosemary Sidley, 31-year-old former Chicago debutante, who had been working in the department as a government stenographer the last several months.

Police said the shooting, which occurred last Monday night in a sitting room of Miss Sidley's rooming house, followed a "jealous argument," heard by other occupants of the house just prior to the sound of two pistol shots.

Miss Sidley was found shot in the chest, and Chandler fatally wounded by a bullet through the head.

Coroner A. Magruder MacDonald said Chandler, married and the father of two children, apparently shot Miss Sidley and then himself.

PENDLETON, July 15 (AP)—A four-engine bomber based at Pendleton field crashed and burned on a rolling wheat field hill six miles northwest of Pendleton this morning. No details have been released by field authorities.

Mr. McNair died Sunday at his Ashland home at the age of 68 years. He was cashier of the First National bank of Ashland and a member of the board of directors. He was also active in Rotary.

TULELAKE — The Tulelake Red Cross chapter saw a busy month in June, according to reports given at the meeting of the executive board, presided over by Rev. Hugh Bronson, chairman. Committee heads reported that the Tulelake chapter is the first town in Siskiyou county to ring the bell on completion of the quota for furnishing the convalescent room at Camp White allotted to this district. A total of \$123.63 was donated by various organizations. A check for \$100 was sent to headquarters by Mrs. E. A. Davis, treasurer.

Ralph Faucett, chairman of the men's surgical dressing class reported that he had contacted Frank Grey, Camp White, field director for the Red Cross, leaving a floor lamp and radio to be used in the room. The local branch is indebted to Mrs. Ray Rowan for the radio, first to be presented to the convalescent quarters.

Siskiyou county, according to Faucett, who recently attended a meeting of the Red Cross in Yreka, is slow in completing its quota of seven rooms and up to date only \$208 has been received. Each room costs \$100 for the bare necessities and any additional furniture is donated.

Nears Completion
All seven rooms of the county quota are nearing completion and it is hoped that all quotas will go over the top before the month ends. More floor lamps and radios are needed, Faucett stated.

Mrs. George Yost, chairman of the home service department, reported that during the month she had made several loans of cash to soldiers, had assisted in discharge papers and extension of furloughs, had made three trips to Newell with magazines and puzzles for the men in service, had assisted with arranging a baseball schedule for the soldiers and had assisted the USO in obtaining covers for pool tables in camp.

Mrs. Roy Urbach, chairman of the sewing group, reported that eight people sewing 56 hours had completed 28 garments including pneumonia jackets and bed socks, had donated supplies for two large boxes and 14 emergency closet items.
