

# BUYING TINGES MARKET WITH SLOW RECOVERY

 Selective buying of steels, rails, air transports and specialties imparted a modest recovery tinge to today's stock market.

While the list still had to contend with light profit cashing on the recent swing to average peaks for nearly four years, the news generally was inspiring to bullish forces and many who trimmed accounts in the latter part of Thursday's session, reinstated commitments to some extent.

Dealings slackened at the full and transfers for the inter-ceedings were around 1,000,000 shares.

Hopeful war tidings from Sicily, Russia and the war Pacific provided the principal stimulus for the early comeback. The Roosevelt-Churchill ultimatum to Italy was a factor. Revamping of Washington economic controls failed to dim inflation psychology particularly and investment funds continued to seek employment. Much of the hesitancy apparent was attributed to the idea more of a technical correction was likely.

WHEAT  
 CHICAGO, July 16 (AP)—Selling of rye unsettled grains today, the market again having to contend with disappointed liquidation over the statement of Price Administrator Prentiss Brown that present ceilings on corn will be maintained. Rye was down more than a cent at times, but losses in wheat and oats were only fractional. Fractional houses gave September wheat support at \$1.44 1/2, steadying the market. Crop reports were favorable and the quality of winter wheat now being harvested was reported as superior to that of last year, particularly with regard to moisture content. It was said one more good rain would carry the spring wheat crop in the northwest to maturity. At the close wheat was 1-1/2 lower, July \$1.44 1/2, September \$1.44 1/2, oats were off 1-1/2, July 70 1/2, and rye was down 1-1/2, July \$1.07.
