

BASIN SCOUTS TO LEAVE FOR CAMP MAKUALLA

More than 70 Klamath Falls, Chilquin and Tulake Scouts will leave for Camp Makualla on Crescent lake at 9 a. m. Sunday. Leaving from the U. S. National Bank building, the bus will be routed to pick up Chilquin Scouts at the Chilquin junction.

Scouts from 10 troops are making the trip and will return on July 25, when a like number of scouts from Bend, Redmond and Prineville are expected to take over the camp.

The scouts will have picnic lunches for the Sunday trip and will have their first meal in camp on Sunday evening. Each boy has had a medical examination and will go to camp in the pink of physical condition.

The camp program will include many activities designed to further build the physique of each scout. Swimming, life saving, rowing, hiking, stalking, and many other activities will build stronger bodies and more alert minds.

Each scout who attends camp will have a new responsibility this year. Each will have to present 11 points in blue food stamps and 16 points in red stamps for each week he stays in the camp.

HIGHWAY GROUP ON LAST LEG OF TOUR

EUGENE, July 17 (AP)—The state highway commission headed home today on the last leg of a western Oregon jaunt to line up post-war projects.

Linn and Lane county proposals were the latest received by the commission. These would include:

A \$500,000 job to improve the Pacific highway from Eugene to Springfield Junction; improvement of the Willamette highway between Eugene and Oakridge and the McKenzie highway east of Eugene; improvement of the Pacific highway on each side of Albany, the South Santiam route between Sweet Home and Cascade and the secondary road between Lyons and Mill City.

The commission, while here yesterday, accepted a deed from Ben F. Dorris, prominent Lane county resident, for a state park site on the McKenzie river, 30 miles above Eugene.

Federal Gift Tax Not Applicable to Oregon Property Law

PORTLAND, July 17 (AP)—Oregon citizens who avail themselves of the state's new community property law will not be subject to a federal gift tax, State Senator Lew Wallace has informed F. H. Young from Washington.

Young is manager of Oregon Business & Tax Research, Inc. Wallace said he got his information from the federal bureau of internal revenue.

The community property law was designed by the last legislature to lift some of the federal income tax load from Oregon taxpayers. It makes possible a community property basis for man and wife so that each may file separate returns.

Sicily Assault Pattern May Be Used on Axis West Wall

LONDON, July 17 (AP)—The imminent prospect of a clean-cut victory in Sicily has confirmed the allied formula for an amphibious assault on western Europe and suggests strongly in the view of some observers that the same pattern will work against Adolf Hitler's Atlantic wall of western France.

There is no intention to imply, these sources pointed out, that the Germans are relying on mere scarecrow defenses. However, reports from the Mediterranean front of surprisingly low allied casualties and rapid progress throw a clearer light on the Nazi theme of impregnability.

The ascendancy of allied air power leaves little doubt, it was said, that the RAF and the eighth U. S. air force will be able to lay down the same ruinous preliminary bombardment and maintain the same efficient umbrella over an allied landing on the French coast as over Italy's sorely-stubbed Sicilian toe.

To Major General Leonard Townsend Gerow, former chief of the United States army's staff war planes division and newly appointed commander of American forces in Britain, goes part of the task of preparing and executing any invasion move in this theatre.

General Gerow, it was announced yesterday, replaces Major General Russell P. Hartle who brought the first American

troops to Europe at the start of the present war. Hartle's new assignment was not disclosed.

British bases are closer to the west wall than the allied Mediterranean bases are to Sicily. Although the German air force in the west is undoubtedly superior to that in Sicily the allies have proved repeatedly that they can control the skies over France.

A simple fact illustrated by Sicily seems to be that the axis, for all its reserves, can not maintain an adequate front against the Russian army and still man the whole rim of the continent to fight a concentrated attack at beachheads of allied choosing, observers here said.

Nine Drowned in Lake Huron During Church Excursion

EAST TAWAS, Mich., July 17 (AP)—Search was resumed today for the bodies of seven of nine youths believed to have drowned when more than a score of panicked excursionists on a church group outing leaped into Tawas bay last night from a water-shipping scow.

Coast guardsmen had recovered the bodies of Ruth Smith, 16, Bay City, and Henry Bascone, 16, Caro. Three boys and four girls still were missing after a check of East Tawas homes which had been opened to care for the survivors.

About 50 delegates to the Saginaw district Methodist Young People's institute here went on an excursion into Lake Huron, half of them aboard a 30-foot gasoline launch hired from a livery and the others in a 20-foot scow towed by the launch.

About 1500 feet off shore, the scow began filling with water and those aboard became frightened and leaped into the bay, coast guardsmen said.

Roller Skates Are "Coming Thing" for Civilian Travel

Klamath folk may as well resign themselves to it. There will be no visit with Uncle Ezra and Aunt Miranda in Oshkintosh this summer. Unless, of course, one doesn't mind roller skating a few hundred miles for the visit—if you can get the roller skates.

First it was gas rationing. Then the buses became too crowded for anywhere's near comfortable travel when you could crowd in one at all. Now it's the trains.

To eliminate overcrowded coaches, the Southern Pacific announces that anyone having to travel must make reservations in advance. When the seats are all filled, there will be no more tickets sold. Chances are that anyone wanting to make just a pleasure trip cannot be accommodated, due to the extensive necessary war travel.

According to local railroad officials, this new arrangement, which is uniform throughout the Southern Pacific lines on the Pacific coast, is especially necessary in Klamath Falls. This is because the SP is the only railroad out of here carrying passengers. With the more than 60 military camps and new industries located on their lines and the heavy civilian passenger travel, a tremendous load is placed upon the trains.

The wartime plan of requiring coach reservations will limit the number of persons on the train. Also, travelers will know in advance whether or not any space is available.

Special arrangements are being made to hold out a certain amount of coach space for military traffic and any seats that are left will be sold to civilians. This makes one thing almost certain—if you get a ticket, you get a seat.

Reservations cannot be made by telephone because of the load on telephone lines. Service men must make reservations, too, but their requirements will be given preference.

VIERECK CONVICTED AS GERMAN AGENT

WASHINGTON, July 17 (AP)—George Sylvester Viereck, writer and publicist, was convicted late last night for the second time on charges of concealing from the state department his propaganda activities on behalf of Germany before the United States entered the war.

A federal court jury returned a guilty verdict on all six counts of an indictment charging violation of the foreign agents registration act. The jurors deliberated slightly less than nine hours.

Justice Bolitha J. Laws indicated he would impose sentence next Friday. The conviction carries a possible maximum sentence of 12 years in prison and \$6000 fines. Viereck was convicted in March, 1942, and served one year of an eight-month to two-year term before the supreme court remanded the case for a new trial.

WOMEN MARINE RECRUITERS TO ARRIVE HERE

A San Francisco radio writer and a reporter from The Argentine will visit Klamath Falls next Monday and Tuesday. They are Sergeants Tia Lange and Ruth Bachman of the marine corps women's reserve. The five-foot recruiters in forestry green will be at 201 Stewart-Drew building, 731 Main street, interviewing women applicants for the corps, according to Sergeant Lester Finley.

Miss Bachman spent the first five years of her life in the Danzig Free State. After a world tour, her family settled in Buenos Aires. After completing her education, she served as secretary of an American school and reporter on the daily El Diario, newspaper. She describes her most memorable job as working for President Roosevelt during the 1935 Pan-American peace conference. Sergeant Bachman returned to the United States in 1940 after a 36-day "cruise" aboard a Japanese freighter hauling 400 sons and daughters of the emperor from South America to their homeland.

Miss Lange served as chief of communications for the fourth army in San Francisco a period of 30 months before entering the marine corps. She was in the same assignment with the Alaska travel control, Seattle, for one year. Before this government service, she was employed by the Don Lee Mutual network in San Francisco producing radio shows and newscasts.

LONDON, July 17 (AP)—Allied planes flew over Rome last night dropping leaflets, the Italian communique reported today. The communique was broadcast from Rome and recorded here.

Presumably the leaflets contained the Churchill-Roosevelt proclamation issued yesterday demanding that Italians capitulate or suffer the consequences.
