Friendship Club To Have Meeting

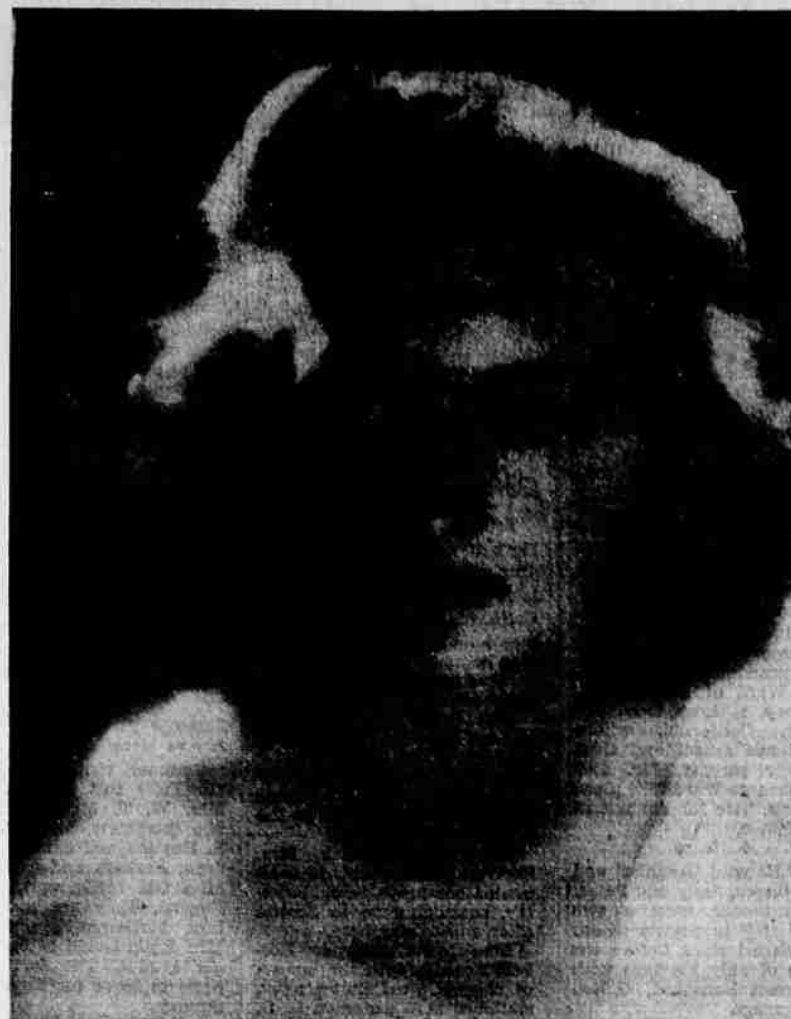
