Subscription Gain Noted by Newspapers

NEW YORK, July 20 (AP)—Daily newspapers are hitting a new high record for subscription and newsstand sales with a gain of 1,679,170 daily buyers—a rise equal to 3.9 per cent over pre-war sales—according to a survey by the Audit Bureau of Circulation.

The ABC report shows that 43,759,561 newspapers were sold by the total 1753 United States dailies (English language) in the six months period ending March 31, 1943. This total compares with daily sales of 42,080,391 by 1857 papers during the six months period ended September 30, 1941—showing that 104 fewer newspapers are averaging better daily sales.

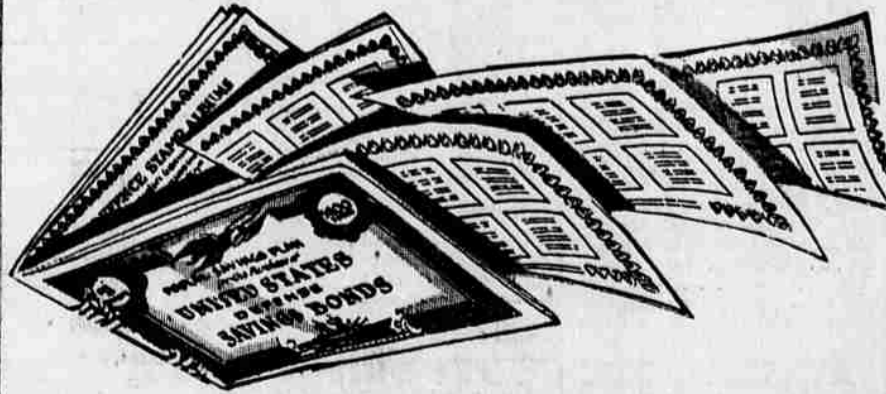

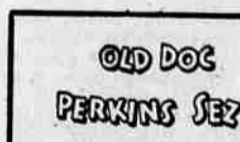

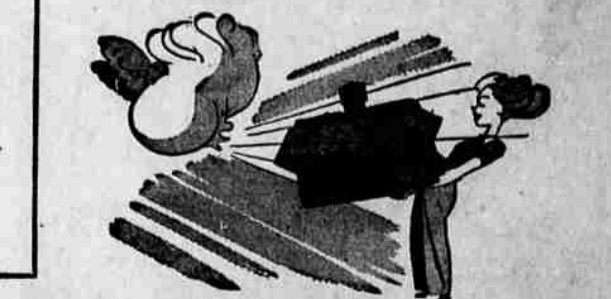
