STOCKS BACK DOWN DESPITE TOP WAR NEWS

NEW YORK, July 20 (AP)—Stocks generally backed water in today's market notwithstanding continuing good war news.

The excuse given by most Wall streeters was that there had been considerable discounting of allied successes with the resultant cashing of profits on lengthy recovery.

Idle investment funds were still plentiful but purse strings were tightened on the idea purchases could be made at more favorable levels.

Irregularly improved prices at the start were succeeded by a midday reaction which carried numerous issues down fractions to two points or more. Dealings expanded on the retreat. Transfers were around 1,100,000 shares.

Conspicuous on the offside were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, New Haven preferred, Central Railway of N. J., Goodrich, Sears Roebuck, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Westinghouse, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Du Pont, Allied Chemical, Consolidated Edison and J. C. Penney. American Telephone resistant, as were U. S. Rubber, General Electric and Eastman Kodak.

COOKED MAYONNAISE

2 egg yolks	1/4 tsp. paprika
2 tbs. mustard	1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. salt	1/4 cup vinegar
1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper	1 cup salad oil
1/2 tsp. garlic salt	1 tsp. shortening
1/2 tsp. celery salt	1/2 cup enriched flour
	1 cup water

a. Combine egg yolks, seasonings and vinegar in deep mixing bowl.
b. Add oil without stirring.
c. Make sauce: Melt shortening in top of 1-qt. double boiler. Add flour and gradually add water, stirring until smooth. Cook over rapidly boiling water until mixture is thick and smooth, about 10 minutes, stirring occasionally.
d. Pour hot, cooked sauce into bowl with oil and vinegar mixture and beat with rotary beater until smooth and fluffy, about 3 minutes.
e. Store in covered jar in cool place. Makes 1 pt.

PIQUANT FRENCH DRESSING—Combine 1/4-cup vinegar or lemon juice with 3/4-cup oil, preferably olive oil. Season with 1/2 tsp. salt, a dash of pepper, 1/4 tsp. paprika and 1 tsp. sugar. Pour into a bottle or jar containing a bud of garlic and a whole clove. Shake vigorously. Remove garlic after an hour or two if you just want a tiny hint of the garlic flavor. Always shake before using.

HOMAYONNAISE—Beat together 1 egg yolk, 1 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. dry mustard and 1/2 tsp. sugar. When frothy, add 1 tsp. vinegar or lemon juice and beat again. Beat in salad or olive oil very gradually, adding just a few drops at a time to prevent curdling, until 3/4 cup oil has been added. When mixture thickens, add another tsp. vinegar or lemon juice and beat again.

FRUIT SALAD DESSERT DRESSING—Combine 1 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, homemade or prepared dressing, with 1 cup creamy cottage cheese and 1/4-cup honey. Serve generously over fruit salad desserts. Delightful for those luncheon salads that are a meal in themselves.
