SPECIALTIES, RAILS LEAD IN RECOVERY JOG

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Rails and specialties led another selective recovery jog in today's stock market and assorted new highs for the past 3 to 6 years were well distributed. Railway bonds did better.

Carriers apparently responded to additional pleasing revenue summaries and talk of near-by dividends. Individual business prospects helped some favorites. Further profit taking still was this was absorbed without much difficulty in most cases.

Prices were irregularly improved at the start and, while losers cluttered the ticker, closing advances of fractions to a point or more were in the majority. There were a few wider spreads. Transfers were around 900,000 shares.

Peak marks for 1943 or long er were posted for Santa Fe, Pepsi-Cola, Austin Nichols Common and "A." Electric Power and Light Preferred, U. S. Rubber Common and Preferred, and American Telephone. In front also were Southern Pacific, Southern Railway, Northern Pacific, Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, Sperry, Nehi Corp., and Twin City Rapid Transit Preferred.

Soft spots included Devoe and Reynolds "A," Du Pont, American Can, Phillips Morris and Westinghouse. Motors and oils were indifferent.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 22 (AP)—Milling demand for wheat expanded today and, in the absence of any heavy selling, prices advanced about a cent at times. Hopes for an increase in flour business appeared to be the major factor in the upturn, although strength at Winnipeg lent a supporting influence.

At the close wheat was 1-3/4 higher, July 1-4-1/4, September 1-4-1/4, oats were up 1-1 cent and rye showed gains of 1-1 cent.

OPA Views Bend Milk Price Change

BEND, July 22 (AP)—Milk production cost for the central Oregon area has been compiled by the OPA and will be examined with an eye to price change. Data was compiled by Harold Frampton, auditor from the Portland office.

Frampton's visit to Bend followed a notice signed by most dairymen declaring that they would discontinue fluid milk deliveries on August 1 unless OPA adjusted milk price ceilings to \$1 a butterfat pound for grade A milk and 65 cents for grade C.

OREGON FARM, WEATHER TOLD FOR LAST WEEK

Precipitation was light and scattered in Oregon during the week ending July 20 and temperatures were high, some exceeding 90, the department of commerce-weather bureau farm-weather report showed today.

Nights were cool in some of the elevated areas with a light frost reported. Irrigation water was plentiful.

Winter grain continued to ripen normally and there has been some threshing. The crop is light in a few areas but mostly good. Early spring grain is headed and some is ripening. Corn is backward. Some sweet corn is on the market.

Most sweet cherries have been picked except in late-developing areas. Picking of sour cherries is progressing. In several regions the cherry crop turned out better than had been expected.

The peak of the raspberry harvest is past with good yields. Loganberries and youngberries are being picked now. Apricots are reaching the market in limited quantities. The prune crop in many western Oregon localities is fair to good, in eastern Oregon it is light.

The week was favorable for haying; the second crop of alfalfa was being cut along with some wild hay. Feed is good on the higher ranges but unirrigated domestic pastures and the lower ranges are drying.

Digging of early potatoes in Malheur county is progressing.

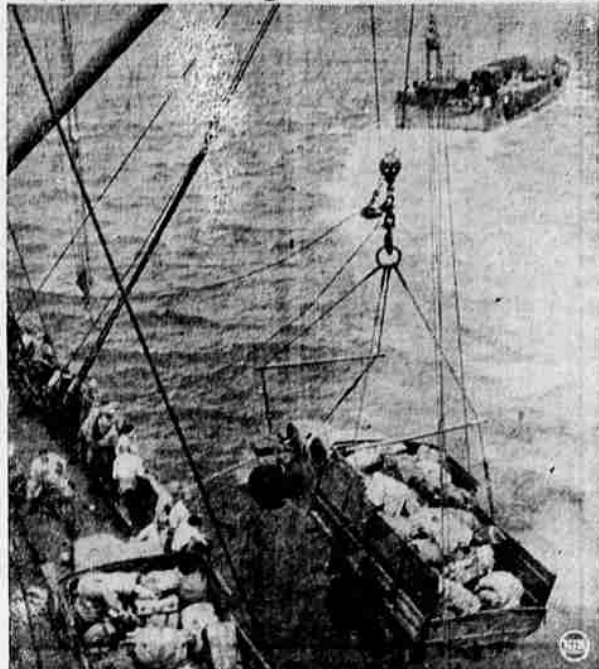
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Supplies 'Trucking' on Down to Rendova

"Dirty Girty" First Flying Fortress to Land on Sicily

WITH THE UNITED STATES SEVENTH ARMY IN SICILY, July 17 (Delayed) (AP)—"Dirty Girty," from somewhere in North Africa, was the first Flying Fortress to land on Sicily—but it was an unscheduled stop which had the crew thinking that maybe "Girty's" sixty-third bombing mission over enemy territory would be her last.

The bomber was in plenty of trouble when First Lieut. Earl Hammond of Eau Claire, Wis., set her down on an emergency landing strip that invasion troops captured several days ago.

"I'm certainly glad you boys took this strip of land," Hammond told a cheering crowd of soldiers which gathered around the battered plane. "If you hadn't, I'd be floating around in the Mediterranean somewhere."

"Dirty Girty" was one of a large flight of Fortresses which went over the toe of Italy this morning to bomb San Giovanni. The raid was directed at the harbor, from which small boats and ferries have been plying the strait to Sicily.

"When we went in for our bombing run they threw everything but the kitchen stove at us," Hammond said. "There was ample flak and plenty accurate."

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BRITISH TARS MEET U. S. SAILOR LACK

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—The British, with a surplus of experienced seamen, and the United States, with a shortage of them, have decided to meet the problem by transferring American freighters to British registry.

American-built Liberty ships thus transferred will be operated by British crews, under the Union Jack, but ownership will remain with the U. S. war shipping administration. Transfers are being made on a charter basis through the lend-lease administration.

Lend-lease estimated today that about 200 Liberty ships aggregating 2,000,000 deadweight tons had been transferred, and shifts are continuing on a regular but unspecified rate.

The shortage of seamen in this country was described as not general, but rather acute in some classifications. The British, as the long-time No. 1 seafaring nation, had many more trained seamen than the United States at the start of the war, and the rapid growth of the American merchant marine through new construction has skyrocketed the demand for skilled crews.

Alleged Whiskey Thieves Held in Baker by FBI Men

PORTLAND, July 22 (AP)—Everett Metzker, Marvin Willis and Virgil Wilcox, charged in federal warrants issued today with the theft of 68 cases of whiskey from a railroad car, were being held at Baker.

Russell P. Kramer, special agent in charge of the Portland FBI office, said Metzker and Willis were employees of the Union Pacific. Wilcox is Metzker's brother-in-law.

Kramer said the theft occurred at Huntington. The whiskey, valued at \$2000, was in transit from Lawrenceburg, Ind., to the Oregon liquor commission warehouse here.

Internment Camps Being Built for African Prisoners

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—So that many of the 267,000 axis prisoners captured in North Africa may be moved to this country "as quickly as possible," new internment camps are to be built throughout the United States and existing ones are to be enlarged.

In announcing those plans yesterday, the war department disclosed that 65,058 axis prisoners now are interned in 38 camps in this country, and that the capacity of camps already built is 139,164.

Prisoners already interned include 45,355 Germans, 19,641 Italians and 62 Japanese.
