Endorsement of Gasoline Coupons Explained by OPA

Procedure for endorsing gasoline coupons was explained again by the district OPA today as motorists were reminded that endorsements on all but "E" and "R" coupons must be made not later than July 22.

The endorsements must be written, stamped or printed in ink on the face of each coupon not later than July 22 on coupons issued before that date, and immediately after receipt upon coupons issued on or after that date, the agency said.

Details for endorsement of the various types of coupons follow: On the front of "A" coupons the license number and state of registration must be noted.

On "B," "C," "D," "T" and "TT" coupons, the license number and state of registration must also be noted, the only exception being in the case of interchangeable coupon books issued for fleet or official vehicles. For these, the official or fleet designation (or certificate of war necessity number in the case of commercial vehicles not bearing fleet designations) and the state and city (or town) in which the principal office of the fleet operator is located.

For "E" and "R" coupons, the name and address of person to whom ration is issued, only exception being that no endorsement is required on "E" and "R" coupons transferred in exchange for gasoline delivered on the premises of the ration holder.

For "bulk coupons" the name and address of the ration holder. Bulk coupons issued for furlough travel, however, require

no notation, but license number and state of registration must appear on the validation stamp to which coupons are attached.

For "inventory coupons," the name and address of the establishment of the dealer or distributor to whom coupons were issued.
