

NEW SCHEDULE INAUGURATED FOR TRANSPORT

FORT KLAMATH—Starting July 22, the Southern Pacific company inaugurated a new schedule for its Pacific Motor Transport freight truck operating from Klamath Falls to Modoc Point, Williamson River, Chiloquin and Fort Klamath. Formerly the truck arrived in Fort Klamath at 11 a. m., when the driver unloaded freight and picked up local milk and cream from Wood river dairymen for delivery to Klamath Falls creameries later in the day.

When this system proved unsatisfactory during the hot weather, a change was made whereby the truck leaves here at 7 a. m., enabling the driver to deliver the daily shipments of milk and cream early each morning to the Klamath Falls creameries, load freight in Klamath Falls for points on his route and return here in the afternoon.

The new schedule was started for the accommodation of local dairymen, who include E. D. Briscoe, H. T. Williams, C. L. Blickenstaff and R. S. Loosley. These ranchers make daily shipments of milk, and in addition several shipments of cream are sent to Klamath Falls each week. The new PMT driver is E. Stine, who with his wife, will make his home here at Denton's park during the hot summer weather, at the end of which time the former driver, Cleo Epps of Klamath Falls, will again resume the local route.

Stine is the nephew of Mrs. Art Nichols and Dan MacDonald of Fort Klamath. Epps has exchanged routes with Stine for the remainder of the summer, and is now working in the south end of the county. The local PMT freight depot is at the Fort Klamath garage, where freight brought from Klamath Falls for Fort Klamath residents is handled by Mr. and Mrs. Harold Wimer, owners of the garage.

JEOP RIDES SELL \$12,000 IN STAMPS

Approximately \$12,000 worth of war stamps had been sold early Saturday afternoon in connection with the jeep rides given by the soldiers from Camp White and Camp Newell, according to Klamath businessmen in charge of the rides.

Two dollars worth of war stamps enable Klamath people to ride on a jeep driven by one of the soldiers and reports are that the small army vehicles have been busy almost all of the time since they arrived here.

Not only children, but also adults are invited to buy their two dollars worth of war stamps and receive a free ride. They will be taken all over town. Hours on Saturday evening are from 7 until 9 o'clock and the jeeps will be at Eighth and Main streets in connection with a program being put on by the women's service clubs.

President Hopes Rome Will Be Declared "Open City"

WASHINGTON, July 24 (P)—President Roosevelt said Friday the allies still hope that the Germans and fascists will declare Rome an open city.

The chief executive told his press-radio conference that the allies had tried for a year or more to have the Italian capital rendered an open city and hence not subject to attack, but that all these efforts had failed.

Bombing Protection. Discussing the recent air raid on Rome, the president remarked the city contains airports and railroad marshalling yards used to transport guns, troops and ammunition southward. He also said the bombing was to protect American and British lives.

The president would not comment on the letter of Pope Pius XII to his vicar general in Rome deploring the bombing. He said he had had no communication from the pope. The comment he did make came in response to a question whether Rome should be made an open city.

Anxious for Declaration. Mr. Roosevelt said that for more than a year the allies had been anxious to have Rome so declared but that the Italian fascist leaders would not do it. He described Rome as an important military center, with airports close by and actually in the city, and because it makes munitions and has immense marshalling yards for transport of troops and guns to southern Italy. He said the allies had used every argument to have these installations removed and the city declared an open one but that it did not work.

The chief executive then added he still hoped it would be so made.

Touching on the invasion of Sicily, he said it was clear that the allied troops were in great danger by the influx of guns and other military equipment from the Rome area.

Phil Brady Sued Again for \$35,000 By Housekeeper

PORTLAND, July 24 (P)—Phil Brady, state legislator and president of the Portland Central Labor council, has been sued again by his former housekeeper, Marion Whitmer, this time for \$35,000.

A jury recently awarded her \$9000 damages on a breach of promise suit. Brady filed a bankruptcy petition in federal court.

In her damage action filed in circuit court here yesterday, she asserted they became engaged in September, 1938, and that until April, 1942, she labored under the belief and expectation of marriage. She charged that Brady enticed her to have illicit relations with him and that she now believes he never intended to keep his promise to marry her.

WALLGREN ASKS ARMY CONTROL OF EVACUEES

LOS ANGELES, July 24 (P)—Expressing opposition to the enlistment of American Japanese in the United States army, Senator Mon C. Wallgren (D-Wash.) in an interview here yesterday said he was pushing a bill to turn the control of Japanese evacuees over to the army.

The senator, a member of the military affairs committee, said the principal failure of the war relocation authority in their management lay in delay in segregating disloyal from loyal evacuees.

Japanese should be put to agricultural work under strict supervision, he said, not only guard against sabotage but for their own protection against possible violence.

Streamliner Plows Into Observation Car; One Killed

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C., July 24 (P)—The Pullman coach section of the Tamiami Champion, Atlantic coast line streamliner en route from New York to Miami, Fla., plowed into the observation of the forward section at a pass-track one mile north of here early today, killing one man and injuring at least five.

The forward section of the Champion was composed of day coaches. None of the cars were derailed, but the engine of the rear section and observation car of the forward unit were smashed.

Macaroni Loaf

1/4 cup macaroni
1 cup cream
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1/4 cup butter
1 tablespoon green pepper
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup grated cheese
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1 teaspoon onion juice
3 egg yolks
3 egg whites
