TROOPS FACE WAR PROBLEMS IN ARMY GAMES

A FIELD HEADQUARTERS, CENTRAL OREGON MANEUVER AREA, July 24 (AP)—Divisional commanders and their troops faced theoretical problems today in the first mass operation of the army's war games in central Oregon.

This maneuver phase concerns divisional strategy and tactics. It will show the results of the division's training in garrison, determine whether its basic training for field operations has been adequate, prove the ability of commanders' leadership for the larger maneuvers this summer and fall which will be warfare itself except for the use of live ammunition.

Nerve center of these operations is corps headquarters—a schoolhouse where maps of the tactical area hang over the blackboards on which Oregon youngsters figured their sums in arithmetic last year.

Dust moves in clouds as jeeps and dispatch riders roar up to headquarters and messengers scurry inside the trim white building where all movements are charted and coordinated.

In the field a division faces an army that exists only on paper. Flags are shifted to show the opposing army's movements in lieu of troops. On the movements of these flags the division's tactics and strategy depend. The flags force changes in operations—compel the divisional troops to halt at a certain objective, retreat, advance, dig in.

Without ever seeing an "enemy" even in simulated combat, the division is forced into every conceivable tactical movement that might be necessary on foreign soil.
