

Butter Points Jump on August 1; Lard Drops; Meat Values Unchanged

WASHINGTON, July 27 (AP)—Butter will cost the housewife two more points per pound beginning August 1, but shortening, lard, salad and cooking oils will cost one point less and no major changes will be made in meat values, the office of price administration (OPA) announced today.

The new red point values will remain in effect through September 4.

The two-point increase for butter brings the cost to 10 points a pound. Margarine remains unchanged at four points.

In jumping the point cost of butter, OPA said it was attempting to bring consumer demands into line with the available supply. For several months, it was explained, civilian consumption of butter has exceeded allocation.

OPA predicted that the higher point cost of butter would stimulate the demand for other fats and oils. The new point value for lard is three points a pound, while shortening and salad and cooking oils are set at four points.

OPA removed two meat items from the rationed list. Fresh pork backbones and feet (bone in), which have cost one point per pound, become ration-free.

OPA said these items were made ration-free because of the large supply and the fact that government agencies do not purchase them. Canned pigs feet, bone end, will cost one point for August, compared with two points during July.

While no changes were made in the more popular beef cuts, OPA predicted an increase of about 10 per cent in the civilian supply.

The increase in the beef supply is expected to offset a decline in the supply of pork.

Here are the changes in red stamp values:

Fats, oils and dairy products: Lard, three points, down one. Shortening, four points, down one.

Salad and cooking oils (one pint or one pound), four points, down one.

Butter: Ten points, up two. Pork—Fatbacks and clear-plats, two points, down one. Feet (bone in) ration free, down one.

Jowls, two points, down one. Backbones, ration free, down one.

Plates, regular, three points, down one. Bacon, plate and jowl squares, three points, down one.

Ready-to-eat meats: Picnic or shoulder slices, 11 points (new item).

Pigs feet, bone in, one point, down one.

Meats (in tin or glass containers): Beef—English cut roasts, nine points (new item).

Workers Can Protect U. S. From Cheating, Says Tom Clark

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27 (AP)—War plant workers are in key positions to protect their country from being cheated on government contracts, Assistant Attorney General Tom C. Clark said here today. He asserted it was their patriotic duty to report any questionable practices.

Some 2000 investigations of asserted war frauds throughout the country now are under way, Clark said at a press conference. Comparatively few are cases in which there is deliberate production of defective material, he added, but many concerns try to slip over an off-grade product by switching tags, pilfering stamps and even bribing inspectors.

INDICTMENT OF ISOLATIONISTS BRINGS CHARGE

DENVER, July 27 (AP)—Dillon S. Myer, director of the war relocation authority, said today there was a larger number of disloyal Japanese at the Tulelake relocation center than at other WRA projects.

This is one of the reasons why the Tulelake camp was selected for segregation of the disloyal Japanese this fall, Myer said.

He told The Associated Press there were "four principal reasons" for selection of Tulelake, listing them as:

"First, the matter of size. Tulelake is one of the three largest centers in the country, accommodating more than 15,000 persons.

"Second, it is located where adequate agricultural land is available for subsistence of the Japanese and for work opportunities.

"Third, there are already, we think, a larger number of evacuees at Tulelake who normally would be segregated, than at other centers. This was shown by the number who refused to register their allegiance in February and March.

"And, fourth, because the cen-

ter lies at the edge of an evacuated area."

Myer explained that since evacuees must be accompanied by Caucasian escorts when they leave a center, it would be "rather expensive" to maintain the Tulelake center as one of the regular relocation camps. This, he said, is because the Tulelake center lies so near the edge of the California evacuation area. Therefore, Myer said, the Tulelake camp would be the most practical for evacuees whose movements would be restricted.

Transfer of evacuees from nine other centers to Tulelake will begin early in September and will be completed by November 1, Myer said.

Barbara Brandt New Welfare Worker

Evils of Hog Ceiling Price Seen

CHICAGO, July 27 (AP)—"The proposed OPA ceiling price on hogs would definitely decrease the nation's food supply and would increase black market operations," the American Pork Producers association declared in a resolution adopted yesterday.

It added that "Producers know ceilings are impractical and cannot be enforced."

AIRPORT ROAD PROJECT GETS GOING MONDAY

Work was well underway Monday on the project which will provide for a straight and hard-surfaced approach to the airport here.

After the county court had agreed Friday to pay the \$300 cost for the removing of a Copco power line at Peterson hill, where part of the improved road will be located, work began almost immediately.

By Monday noon all preliminary preparations had been completed, the power line removed and blasting just about finished.

Three poplar trees at Summers school were cut down Saturday in preparation for the re-routing of electric power used by that school. With the removal of the power line at Peterson hill, to which the institution has been connected, it will be necessary to convert the school line to the Kerns power line.

On Monday, too, a drag line was started on the road located on the west side of the airport which when completed will take the place of part of market road 20. This road, according to expectation, will soon be closed. A portion of market road 20 is already closed to motorists.
