Malin Woman's Brother Recovers From Wounds Received in North Africa

MALIN, Ore. — Mrs. Irving Capek has received word of the convalescence of her brother, Lieutenant Colonel Jakey Sparks, Hutchinson, Kans., following wounds received in one of the major battles of North Africa. Friends of the lieutenant-colonel who have greeted him here on his visits to his sister will be interested in knowing that he saw the entire African campaign before being knocked out of action and sent to New York for treatment, later being transferred to a hospital at Topeka, Kans.

The 38-year-old officer has been in some form of the service since he was 17, training the "Fighting Hellcats of the West" at Portland just before war broke out. A year ago he took a personally trained flying squadron to England, later going to Africa for the invasion.

From there in letters Col. Sparks has given some fascinating glimpses of African life. He tells of a feast at which he was once host. Two Frenchmen, whom he had never seen, provided the piece de resistance, a live turkey. In return he presented them with some chocolate and cigars and a bit of Palmolive soap that one asked for.

The bird roasted, they found some bread and a bit of beer in a British commissary, used two clean sheets for tablecloths and, by the light of candles, they carved the turkey in grand manner.

He referred in a recent letter also to the pride of the 64th in the bonds that are bought and their slogan is "Fight It and Finance It."


