

# REIMBURSING OF TAX LOSSES BEING STUDIED

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—Members of the house public lands committee will begin August 4 at Flagstaff, Ariz., a series of hearings designed to develop a method of reimbursing states, counties and other taxing bodies for loss of revenue caused by federal acquisition of private lands.

Chairman Peterson (D-Fla.) remarked the problem has been accentuated by wartime acquisition of properties for military and naval installations.

Members of the subcommittee making the western trip are the four ranking democrats and three ranking republicans on the public lands committee: Chairman Peterson (D-Fla.), Representative Robinson (D-Utah), White (D-Idaho), Peterson (D-Ga.), Mott (R-Ore.), Le Compte (R-La.) and Chenoweth (R-Colo.).

Hearings will be conducted at Eugene, Ore., August 11 and Salem, Ore., August 12 on a dispute between two agencies as to which should administer the re-vested Oregon and California grant lands and the reconveyed Coos Bay wagon road lands. A bill providing that certain forested sections of these lands shall be administered by the forest service (HB 1688) is before the committee. The other claimant is the O & C land administration.

## Close-Range Naval Battle Fought Off Cherbourg, France

LONDON, July 29 (AP)—Light British naval forces fought a close-range battle with a dozen enemy armed trawlers and motor torpedo boats off Cherbourg, France, early yesterday and left two German ships blazing, an admiralty communique reported today.

One British warship was hit seriously, but was taken in tow and with the aid of a smoke screen successfully taken to port, the communique said. Enemy shore batteries also participated in the brief engagement, but without effect.

The communique said that the fight was "close range and at high speed," and that the British vessels suffered some casualties and damage.

## Army-Navy Grid Game Pretty Sure, Says Patterson

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—Acting Secretary of War Patterson is "pretty sure" the Army-Navy football game will be played this fall.

Asked at a press conference today whether a formal decision has been made on the contest, he replied:

"I am pretty sure it will be played but that is only my personal opinion."

The game has been tentatively scheduled for the Army's home ground at West Point.
