

# GILLENWATERS PRAISES LOCAL LANDING FIELD

Klamath's municipal airport is one of the finest in America from the standpoint of landing facilities, Lieutenant Colonel T. R. Gillenwaters, former Klamath district attorney, declared here Thursday after landing at the local field for a one-day stopover.

Lieutenant Colonel Gillenwaters is chief of the A4 division of the weather wing, headquarters army air forces, stationed at Asheville, N. C. He is in charge of supply, installation, maintenance, research and development of weather equipment. The weather wing has control of weather stations throughout the world.

Lieutenant Colonel Gillenwaters said he was immensely pleased with the improvements still going on at the local field, and said he was convinced the Klamath port will play an important part in aviation development certain to come on the east side of the mountains.

His pilot on the trip here was Lieutenant R. H. Brady and his crew chief, Master Sergeant L. I. Collins.

Colonel Gillenwaters' family is in Asheville. Mrs. C. M. Ramsby of Klamath Falls, mother of Mrs. Gillenwaters, is with the family in Asheville, but will return to Klamath Falls in September.

Horsemeat offered for sale in Portland does not meet slaughtering requirements for human consumption, City Health Officer Thomas L. Meador announced.

Movie Star Ginger Rogers, whose Rogue river ranch is furnishing much of Camp White's milk, sold \$100,000 in war bonds at Portland's victory center Thursday.

John D. Blandford, Jr., administrator of the national housing agency, said in Portland that the huge Vanport City and Columbia Villa housing projects for shipyard workers will be torn down after the war.

Nine Willamette river houseboats, charged by the Portland health department, with violating sanitary requirements, were moved by the harbor patrol from downtown Portland to the north city limits.

Bond sales in Merrill Thursday night amounted to \$8075, while \$80 in war stamps were sold for 60 rides in the ambulance belonging to the Oregon Women's Ambulance corps, it was reported.

The sales took place at a program put on by Merrill organizations under the direction of the Women of the Moose. Merchandise was auctioned by Colonel Swigart.

# Montgomery Claims Dairymen at Bend Threatened OPA Man

BEND, July 30 (AP)—Richard D. Montgomery, Oregon OPA director in Portland told Bend authorities that one of his auditors, Harold Frampton, on a recent visit to Bend was threatened with physical violence by "a group of dairymen and at least one county agent."

The visit of the auditor followed announcement of dairymen that they will discontinue the delivery of fluid milk on August 1 unless the OPA grants a new ceiling price.

Montgomery said, in a letter appearing in the Bend Bulletin, that when Frampton entered a local hotel lobby following a personal interview with a dairyman "he was set upon by a group of dairymen who subjected him to insults and even threats of physical injury."

# Willamette Board Appoints Manager

SALEM, July 30 (AP)—The executive board of the Associated Students of Willamette university today appointed Dr. Robert E. Lantz, assistant professor of education, to be general manager of student activities, succeeding Professor Leslie J. Sparks, who held the job for 17 years.

Sparks was appointed two days ago to be acting head of the physical education department, succeeding Roy S. Keene, who now is a lieutenant commander in the naval reserve.
