**WHEAT**

**CHICAGO, July 30 (AP)**—A sharp break in rye following a modest advance at the start unsettled other grains today, cancelling early gains in wheat and oats. Rye fell about 3 cents from peaks established shortly after the opening, and was down more than 2 cents from the previous close.

The late selling completely erased earlier gains which had been based on an advance in parity between June 15 and July 15 and at the close wheat was unchanged to 1 lower, September \$1.44 1/2, oats were down 1/4, September 70-70 1/2 and rye was off 1-1 1/4, September \$1.00 1/2-\$1.01.

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## SELLING SPREE SWEEPS MART; LEADERS DROP

**NEW YORK, July 30 (AP)**—Renewed selling swept through the stock market today, dropping many leaders under Thursday's recovery levels and in some instances carrying quotations still lower.

Rails, steels, motors, rubbers and aircrafts—most of the so-called "war" equities and many with peace prospects—were prominent in the decline. While the offerings lacked much of the urgency evident Monday and Tuesday, bids were scarce, brokers said.

Losses ranged from fractions to more than three points in the final hour. Volume amounted to about 1,000,000 shares.

Under water were U. S. Steel, General Motors, Goodyear, J. I. Case, Deere, Douglas, Santa Fe, Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Standard Oil, N. J., American Can, Union Carbide, Johns-Manville and Pepsi-Cola. Bethlehem, also slipped.
