## LOUISE WENGER TO SUPERVISE BIBLE SCHOOL

Miss Louise Wenger of Salem, Ore., graduate of Huntington Park Bible school, Huntington Park, Calif., and vacation Bible school's supervisor of experience, will be the vacation Bible school's department head for the year to be held at the Church of the Nazarene, 620 Martin Street, beginning Monday, August 2.

The meetings begin at 9 a. m. each day except Saturday and conclude at 11:30 a. m. The subject for the series will be "The Life of Christ," and is open to all children, ages three to fourteen, inclusive.
