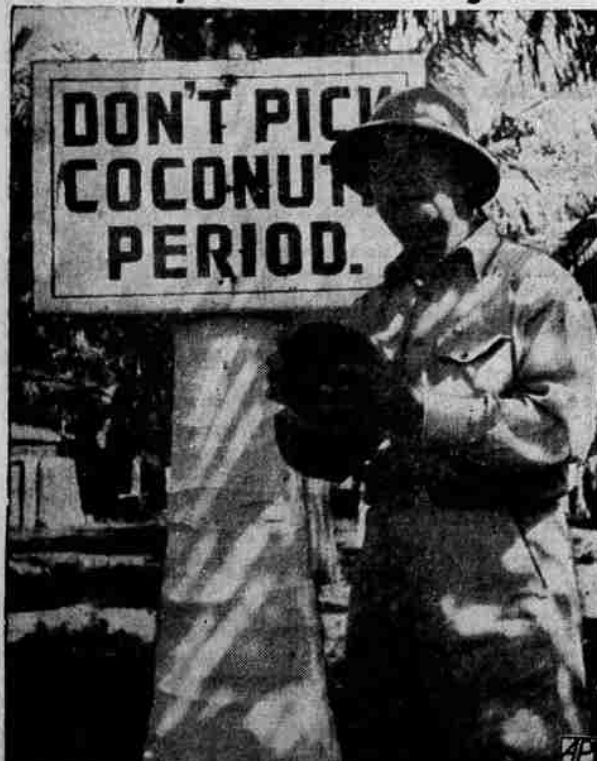
TODAY'S GUEST STAR

New Navy Rule on Sports Stymies Big Grid Games

NEW YORK, Aug. 2 (AP)—A new set of navy sports rules all but wipes the 1943 football schedule of the Iowa Seahawks, threatens the all-star grid game at Chicago and makes impossible a duplicate of the 1919 Rose Bowl contest in which the Great Lakes Sailors walloped the Marines, 17 to 0.

The regulations, issued by Navy Secretary Knox at Washington last night prohibits navy teams from going outside the national collegiate athletic association district in which they are located to meet a sports foe. The Seahawks, stationed at Iowa City in district 5, are scheduled to play Illinois, Ohio State, Marquette, Minnesota and Notre Dame, all in district 4.

Another rule says that "individuals in the navy who have been or are prominent in sports will not be permitted to engage in contests in sports away from their stations except as members of a team representing the activity."

That would remove numerous names from the All-Star roster for the game at Chicago, Aug. 25 between collegians, many of them already under navy control, and the Washington Redskins.

There were indications that those two rules might be relaxed in some instances upon written application to the chief of navy personnel but the regulations re-affirmed the law that no sailor-athlete could be away from his station more than 48 hours and that V-12 freshmen were not eligible for athletics. All bowl games also were banned.

OSC Moves Back
Terms to Conform With Army Schedule

CORVALLIS, Aug. 2 (AP)—Oregon State college terms will be set back on the calendar this year to conform to a training schedule set up for army enlisted men now studying here.

Fall term registration will be October 5-9. The Christmas holiday will be limited to a three-day period with the term to end in final examinations December 27-31.

The mid-winter holiday will be January 1-11, with registration opening on the last day for the winter term. Final examinations will end for the second term April 1. The spring term will be April 11-June 29.

Drive to Lift Output Of War Plants Set

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Conceding that there are many "psychological and physical" obstacles to be overcome, War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson today ordered a new drive to lift the output of American war plants by 30 per cent for the rest of the year.

In the twelfth of a series of monthly reports, Nelson noted that June production gained somewhat over May, but still failed to meet scheduled requirements, which are rising steadily.

Portlanders, Rainiers Tie Up at Third

Seattle Loses Nightcap To Oakland While Ducks Split With Hollywood

The Seattle winning streak was snapped at eight games here yesterday as the Rainiers lost a nightcap ball game 3 to 2 to Oakland, after grabbing the opener, 3 to 1.

The loss kept Portland and the Rainiers deadlocked for third place as the Beavers split with Hollywood, winning the opener 3 to 1 and losing the second, 4 to 2.

In the first game at Seattle the Rainiers rapped out two home runs in the opening inning to give Byron Speece all the lead he needed. Speece allowed but five hits.

The procedure was reversed in the seven-inning nightcap, with Oakland taking a two-run lead in the first when Johnny Vergez and Hugh Luby singled and Les Scarsella lashed out a double to bring them home.

Ad Liska pitched the Beavers to victory in the first game at Portland. He gave up nine hits but it took Ken Richardson's four-base blow to produce a run.

San Francisco took a double-header from Sacramento, 5-2 and 14-10. The totals of the short second game showed that six pitchers gave up 27 hits.

The San Diego Padres gained a split with Los Angeles, losing the first game 13 to 2 but coming back to win 8 to 1 in the second.

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho, Aug. 2 (AP)—Rex Buck, 66, well known in northwest horse racing circles, died yesterday at a local hospital after an illness of two weeks.

For many years his horses raced in Mexico, California and Florida during the winter and Canada and the northwest states in the summer.

During his racing career, Buck helped develop such well-known jockeys as Wayne Wright, Hank Mills and Ralph West.

Survivors include his widow, brothers Bud Buck of Deer Park, Wash., Mark and Day Buck, both of Spokane, Wash.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 2 (AP)—Camp Adair's Timber Wolves claimed the military baseball championship of the Pacific northwest today.

The Timber Wolves, with Jack Knott, formerly of the Philadelphia Athletics, pitching effective nine-hit ball, defeated the Fort Lewis Warriors yesterday, 10-6.

It was tough going for the Wolves for four innings as the Warriors' moundsman, 18-year-old Eddie Erautt, lately of the Hollywood Pacific Coast league club, allowed only two runs. Angell Bill Pends To Aid Service Men By Extending Pay

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) is one of several members of congress who have pending bills which would aid in carrying out the president's recommendation that members of the armed forces be provided pay after the war is ended.

Angell introduced in the house on July 2 a bill to provide for continuing the pay of all persons serving in the armed forces for one year after conclusion of the war. His measure now before the military affairs committee provides that no person shall receive more than \$200 a month unless called for active service. It would place all members of the armed forces in the reserve forces subject to call and provides their pay shall continue for one year after their honorable discharge from the service.
