**Bake Him Homemade Bread for Lunch Box Sandwiches**

GIVE that war worker of yours the extra lunch box treats he deserves. Bake him homemade bread! Its good homemade flavor will entice him to eat every crumb. And, remember, bread baked with today's enriched flour assures your worker the iron and B vitamins he needs.

**HELPFUL HINTS**—Sift flour before and after measuring. Flour packs down and cannot be measured accurately until loosened up by sifting. Knead dough in bowl with light, quick movements until it no longer clings to the sides. Bake bread until it gives a hollow sound when thumped with fingers. Remove from pans, cool on rack.

Mind you, it's easy to bake bread nowadays. With the new home-type flour that's made especially for home baking you can't fail. Try this tested recipe and see:

Sift enriched home-type flour, measure 9 cups, sift again. Heat 1 1/2 cups milk, add 1 1/2 cups water; cool to lukewarm; add 1 1/2 cakes fresh yeast, crumbled, 3 tbsps. sugar, 1 1/2 tbsps. salt; stir until dissolved. Add flour and 3 tbsps. shortening, mix until combined. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth. Place in greased bowl, cover with damp cloth; let rise in warm place (80° to 85° F.) to double in bulk, about 2 hours. Punch down; let rise again until double in bulk, about 1 hour. Divide into three equal parts; shape each into ball and let stand on lightly-floured board 15 minutes. Shape into 3 loaves; place in well-greased bread pans (9 x 4 x 3); let rise in warm place until well-rounded over top of pan, about 1 hour. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15 minutes; then moderate oven (350° F.), about 30 minutes longer or until done. Makes 3 one-pound loaves.
