**Hitler's Health
Reported Causing
Germans Anxiety**
LONDON, Aug. 4 (AP)—A Reuters dispatch from Stockholm quoted the unconfirmed report of the NYA Dagligt Allehanda today that Adolf Hitler's health is giving cause for anxiety in Germany.

The correspondent wrote to the Swedish newspaper that Heinrich Himmler, head of all German police organizations, "asked Hitler's physicians to give a true report, which was 'very bad'; the fuhrer often appears apathetic and depressed."

The correspondent added that "in Germany discussions about an eventual successor already have begun."

BLUE CHIPS LEAD STOCKS IN RECOVERY

NEW YORK, Aug. 4 (AP)—Shares of blue chip rating led another recovery in today's stock market.

Buying was encouraged by the market's strong performance yesterday after a week of continuous decline. Several of the higher priced investment issues pushed up 1 to 2 or more points at the best but most were somewhat under the high. The list had an assortment of losers. Steels, rubbers, motors and aircrafts lacked buoyancy near the finish and some rails were a bit heavy.

Gainers included American Telephone, Westinghouse, American Can, Dow Chemical, Dupont, Johns-Manville and Texas Co.

Volume fell rather sharply, running to around 800,000 for the season, after a long string of better-than-a-million share days.

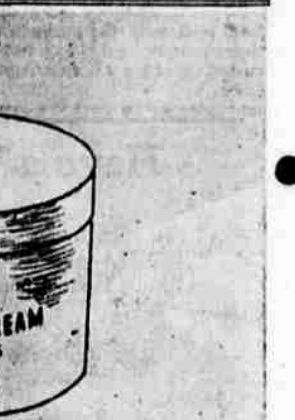

Today's Roundup

TOMORROW, Klamath takes the lumber industry limelight in the dedication of the world's greatest tree farm—the 508,000-acre Weyerhaeuser Timber company holdings in this area.

The event also will be the occasion of the first visit to this city of Governor Earl Snell since he became the state's chief executive.

It will be quite a day, and Klamath people, whether they attend any of the events in the program, will be interested in their significance.

They are especially significant at this time, when there is a good deal of discussion of the industrial future of this lumbering community, particularly as it is to be affected by timber supply.

Reassuring

WE like the name, "tree farm," because it denotes exactly the kind of a place it is—an area where trees are grown as a crop and harvested as a crop, just as is done with other crops on other farms.

On a tree farm, of course, it takes longer to grow the crop than on a wheat ranch or a potato farm.

Hence, it takes a long view, a careful plan, and a permanent investment for the establishment of a real tree farm.

From the standpoint of this community's future, it is reassuring that the biggest timber holdings in the area have qualified as a tree farm.

Official Definition

WE'VE been talking in our own language. We asked for an official definition of a tree farm, and here it is:

"A Tree Farm is an area of forest land devoted primarily to the continuous growth and production of merchantable forest products under consciously applied forest practices. It applies to privately owned forest land. Owners of timber land are eligible to apply for registration of forest areas as a Tree Farm, if they meet the following requirements:

1. Assure a willingness to maintain the land designated for the production of forest crops;
2. Provide reasonable protection from fire, insects, disease, and from danger by excessive grazing;
3. Harvest timber crops from the area in a manner which will assure future crops."

Registration in the National Tree Farms system is under the sponsorship and direction of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association. There's the story, officially and unofficially.

Why No. 1

THE local tree farm has been described in advance publicity as the nation's No. 1 tree farm.

We asked what that means—does it mean it is the first tree farm, the biggest, or what have you?

The answer was that this is the biggest tree farm in the country, and the first established in the Western Pine association area. There are other tree farms in fir, but none so big as this one.

In recent months, there has been a rash of stories about people leaving Klamath Falls.

Special note should go to the story Saturday announcing that Sam Lockwood, former Klamath lumberman, is back here as general manager of the Beatty Logging company. He'll be warmly welcomed by many friends.

The War Today

THE way things now look in the European laboratory of war, the allied bombing of Germany and occupied territory may be the agent which will precipitate victory.

Dispatches to Swiss and Swedish newspapers from their correspondents give a composite picture of a Germany which is enduring such horrors that "nobody knows how long the population will be able to endure it." The undreamed of striking power being shown by the allied air navies has convinced the reich that a new phase of the war has been opened.

One Stockholm dispatch describes the bombing as having an effect similar to that of the allied naval blockade in 1918, when the morale of the German people cracked because of hunger and other privations.

The weight of trouble which caused the people to quit in 1918 isn't a speck on the moon to what they shortly will be getting from the cumulative effect of allied bombing.

The bombardment serves the double purpose of destroying war resources and of disrupting communications as to put many parts of the country on short rations.

On the Way

IT'S only so far back as May 19 that British Premier Churchill announced to a joint session of the senate and house in Washington that the allies were about to undertake the historic experiment of trying to bomb Germany and Italy into impotency. That's less than three months ago—a very short time to show big results in such a vast undertaking, which must depend on cumulative destruction.

Since then allied bombers have blazed the trail for a Sicilian invasion which is forging to success. If Marshal Badoglio persists in his suicidal resistance, it's not unlikely that bombing will force the collapse of the Italian mainland even before the allies invade it.

We have only now arrived at the time when we might expect a yell from the Boche if the experiment was going well. We finally have drawn that yell by a steady destruction of industries, supply centers, submarine and shipping bases, and communications by rail and highway. Resistance by the nazi airforce has decreased as our devastation has multiplied.

Hamburg Got It

THE casualty roll in many cities has been heavy, but it has remained for the wholesale assault on the great port of Hamburg to make Germany realize the awfulness of the steadily growing power which has been unleashed.

One Danish consular official is quoted in Copenhagen as estimating that 200,000 people have been killed in Hamburg. It would be well to accept that figure with reserve, but the police of the ruined city are said to place the killed, wounded and missing at 30,500.

The continued assault on Hamburg has given rise to the idea that the allies are bent on total destruction of the city, and that other metropolitan centers of military importance will follow. The Germans themselves have jumped to the conclusion that Berlin is next on the list, and a partial evacuation is under way.

MALTA REVEALED AS HEADQUARTERS

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 4 (AP)—The island of Malta was disclosed today to have been General Dwight D. Eisenhower's operational headquarters for the allied attack on Sicily.

The general and his staff went there four days before the scheduled beginning of the offensive and he stayed in a palace built in 1540 by the Knights of St. John. There he was a guest of Field Marshal Lord Gort, governor general.

These facts were disclosed today as the allied commander-in-chief paid special tribute to the island's people, "the most bombed and shot on earth," to Lord Gort and to the Malta air force.

During Gen. Eisenhower's stay there, offices were placed in limestone tunnels, grim reminders of the year in which the island was subjected to more than 2000 air raids.

Dr. Masters' Health Column— Proper Posture Valuable Asset to Your Good Health

During World War I, employers everywhere learned the advantages inherent in good posture on the job. They even made a strenuous effort to supply their employees with the proper seating facilities during hours of work, and if consciousness of the need for proper posture took a slump, so to speak, in the less well-united twenties and thirties, World War II may prove another impetus to good bodily position and all it can mean in improved health and efficiency. Particularly with enormously increased numbers of women entering factories and workshops is the need for improved posture making itself felt.

FATIGUE INVITES DISEASE
As in any machine, in the human body as well, displacement of parts brings its toll of less efficient running, and in time, of damage to parts. Lowered resistance to disease and fatigue inevitably follow, and needless absenteeism may be the result. The bones form the basic structure of the body, and when they are forced out of line as in abnormal postures, curvatures of the spine, a pushed-forward pelvis, muscle and joint strains appear that may cause serious difficulty, even going so far as to contribute to arthritis, a disease reputed to cause more economic loss than either heart trouble or cancer. Backache, fallen arches, and foot pain are likewise often the result of faulty posture.

In physiologically functioning to the best advantage, also, the body needs to be carried well. The diaphragm is the muscle of respiration, and if the blood system is to receive its full quota of oxygen, the diaphragm must be held properly to do its work. When the heart does not have enough blood supply to pump, because there is not sufficient oxygen, congestion may develop in the great veins, and impose strain upon the heart. Possibly most important of all, the large abdominal organs, which are the seat of nutrition and excretion, must be held in place rightly, and even the pelvic organs of reproduction are not exempt from the effects of poor posture. And the mind itself performs more efficiently in a body free of imbalance.

HOLD IN ABDOMEN!
Good posture means poise of body in well-balanced line, without tension or rigidity. The weight of the body should be carried forward and to the outside of the feet, the lower abdomen held in and up, the back flat, with head in and chin up. Proper breathing and control of the abdominal muscles are the key to good posture, and pulling in the abdomen usually accomplishes the other factors described above without too much conscious attempt to achieve them. Holding the breath in and the chest up is not successful in correcting poor posture, for the abdominal muscles may be permitted to sag at the same time. Control of the abdominal muscles through exercise is the best single step to take in the direction of satisfactory carriage.
