

DEADLINE FOR PRINTER EXAM APPLICATION

To permit additional printers to apply for responsible positions in the government printing office, Washington, D. C., as estimators and jacket writers, the United States civil service commission today extended its deadline for accepting applications to August 17, 1943.

Men or women with at least eight years' experience in printing, two to four years of which were spent estimating printing cost or specifying production methods are urged to apply.

Appointees will be chosen on the basis of written tests to be given throughout the country.

ARMY TELLS HOW AIRMEN SWEEP SICILY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—The army, casting its usual reticence to the winds, Wednesday put out a blow-by-blow description of how its air forces swept Sicily, Sardinia and the Italian boot in July and summed up with these statistics:

In four weeks, U. S. planes flew 12,583 offensive sorties in the Mediterranean theatre. A sortie is a flight by one plane.

Bombers dropped 12,460 tons of explosives.

Gunners destroyed 342 enemy planes, probably destroyed 34 more.

Three axis ships were sunk and 10 damaged.

U. S. aircraft losses totaled 190.

High point was the bombing of Rome by 272 heavies and 249 medium bombers July 19. They cascaded 1101 tons of bombs on railroad yards.

The northwest African air forces, commanded by Lieut. Gen. Carl Spaatz and the U. S. army ninth air force under Maj. Gen. Lewis H. Brereton, thus "cleared the Sicilian sky of the enemy's planes in July, blasted his air fields to the point of uselessness and pulverized his lines of communications," the war department summary said.

PLANS LAID FOR CADET BOARD VISIT

Final plans for the arrival of Major Eric K. Shilling and an aviation cadet examining board here were announced by Leslie Rogers, local cadet procurement chairman. The air corps examining party will be in Klamath Falls on August 10 and 11, and will headquarter at the Klamath Falls armory. Their hours for interview and examination will be from 10 a. m. to 3 p. m.

The visit of Major Shilling here is a part of the statewide campaign, recently endorsed by Governor Earl Snell, to meet the urgent and mounting need for more aviation cadets to keep step with the army's growing air force. The program, under the direction of Colonel J. J. Fulmer, state recruiting chief, makes it possible for all men 17 to 26 years of age to apply for this training.

Nazi Aluminum Plant Destroyed in Raid On Norwegian Town

LONDON, Aug. 5 (AP)—An official Norwegian spokesman said today information had been received that the American daylight raid on Heroya, Norway, July 24, wiped out the new Nazi aluminum factory there and destroyed other factory areas, a power station and two anti-aircraft batteries.

He said the director of the aluminum factory, which was the main target of the Flying Fortress attack, had reported its destruction was so complete it could not be rebuilt during the war. Forty-two persons were reported killed and 100 injured.

Railway Unions Hold Strike Ballot Pending Conference

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 (AP)—Officers of 15 railway labor unions approved a strike ballot Wednesday but agreed not to issue it pending further conferences with railroad officials, starting Friday.

A strike vote might result in government seizure and operation of the roads for the duration. Railroad officials, anxious to avert this, were reported willing to discuss an agreement to be submitted jointly with the unions for government approval.

August Bond Drive Plans Made by Legion

Members of the American Legion met last night and discussed plans for the August bond drive. Paul Landry will be in charge of the drive.

A slogan, "Knockout Blow," was chosen for the push. The appearance of Frankie Masters and his orchestra later this month will be tied in with the August bond sales program.

Tucker, former Broadway columnist who had been on war duty, returned to this country yesterday by plane under the care of Captain James J. Ryan, chief of the neurological division of the United States army base hospital at Cairo.
