## STOCKS TILT DOWNWARD IN SLOW SESSION

NEW YORK, Aug. 5 (AP)—Stocks tilted a little lower today in one of the slowest sessions of the year.

Prices headed downward over a fair part of the list after an irregular opening. In the final hour some leaders rallied slightly from the lows but fractional minus marks predominated.

Transactions totaled about 600,000 shares.

Considering the long advance, punctuated by last week's sharp decline and yesterday's fairly sizable rally, the shrinkage in volume reflected the usual hesitancy of market followers when a long-maintained trend has been broken.

Rail loans received selective support in the bond market.

 CHICAGO, Aug. 5 (AP)—A good demand for oats, which advanced to within 2 cents of season peaks, featured an otherwise listless trade in grains today. In view of the rapidly-breaking wheat developments, many traders took to the sidelines and activity was light.

Strength in oats was based upon a strong cash demand for this grain and a private crop forecast showing a smaller upturn in estimated corn production that many traders had anticipated. However, the forecast was made as of August 1 and important areas received needed rains after that date.

At the close oats were 1-1/2c higher, September 71-71 1/2c, wheat was 1/4c lower to 1c higher, September rye \$1.02-1/2.
