Red Lights Halt Seals, Seattle Men

Victory Parades Stymied As Stars Top Rainiers; Padres Beat Friscans

The stop sign finally was posted over the weekend on two late-season winning streaks in the Pacific Coast league as both Seattle and San Francisco dropped contests.

Hollywood topped Seattle, 7-4, Saturday for the Rainiers' second loss in 15 games and turned the trick again in the seven-inning nightcap of yesterday's doubleheader, 10-3. The Rainiers won the first game 13-3 for a pair of games in which the issue was decided strictly on power at the plate. Seattle nipped three Hollywood pitchers for 17 hits in the first game while Pete Jonas was allowing but eight. In the nightcap three Seattle pitchers failed to stem a tide of 13 hits while Ronnie Smith gave up but seven for the Stars.

Portland, in fourth place, kept in easy shooting distance of the third place Rainiers by splitting a doubleheader with Oakland. Sid Cohen pitched the Beavers to a 1-0 triumph in the second game, to give Portland the series after the Oaks had squeezed home an 11th inning run to win the opener, 8 to 7.
San Diego won its first game of the San Francisco series by working out a 6 to 5 victory in the second game yesterday. The Seals took the first game 4 to 2 for their 11th straight win.
Los Angeles swept a doubleheader with Sacramento, 14-3 and 1-0.

Doe, Cow Elk Tags Hit Jackpot Sale

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—Applications at the state game commission office today indicated there would not be enough doe deer and cow elk hunting tags to go around.
The deadline is August 16 for the following special tags:
Doe deer—2000 in Grant county, 1000 in the Steens mountains and 6000 in the Lake-Klamath area. The season will be from October 1 to November 3. An additional 250 buck and 400 doe tags will be issued for the Hart mountain reserve for an October 9-24 season.
Cow elk—2000 in the Minam, North Powder and Wenaha areas. The season will be October 26-November 3.
Antelope—2500 for Lake, Harney and Malheur counties. The season will be September 18-October 3.

Tigers Tie Whitesocks On Third Rung Of American Ladder By Three Homers

Rudy York's big bat, suddenly taking a new lease on life, boomed out three home runs yesterday to lead the Detroit Tigers to a double win over Chicago and boost the Tigers into a third place tie with the White Sox.

The circuit clouts, two in the opener and one in the nightcap, augmented sterling pitching performances by Virgil Trucks, who limited the Sox to six hits in winning 8-2, and Tommy Bridges, who twirled a four-hit, 3 to 0 shutout.

The first place New York Yankees and St. Louis Cardinals each swept a doubleheader to further increase their leads in the American and National leagues.

The Yankees, with Spud Chandler twirling a five-hitter for his 14th win of the year, walloped the Philadelphia Athletics, 7 to 1, but had to come from behind to win the second game, 8 to 4, in 10 innings.
The Cardinals stretched their lead to 13 games by beating the

second place Pittsburgh Pirates twice, 8 to 6 and 5 to 2.
Cincinnati moved within half a game of the Pirates by splitting a twin bill with the Chicago Cubs. The Cubs took the opener, 4 to 3, as Hi Bithorn came to Claude Passeau's rescue to stop a late red rally. A big seven-run outburst in the fifth gave Cincinnati the nightcap, 10 to 7, for Bucky Walters' third straight win and eighth of the season.

The fading Brooklyn Dodgers took it on the chin for the tenth straight time when Elmer Nieman doubled Tommy Holmes home in the ninth inning to give the Boston Braves a 5 to 4 victory. Nate Andrews pitched two-hit ball after the third inning for the Braves and now has lost 15 of 18 games.

Large Field Tees Off in Ladies' Golf

Marion Miley Trophy at Stake for 135 in Women's Western Amateur Tourney

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 9 (AP)—The Marion Miley trophy was at stake today as a surprisingly large war-time field of some 135 players teed off in the 43rd annual women's western amateur golf tournament for 32 qualifying berths.

Single rounds of match play will start tomorrow, continuing until Saturday when the two finalists enter a scheduled 36-hole duel for the crown.

There will be a brand new winner, for Betty Jameson, the defending champion, will be unable to leave San Antonio, Tex., where she is working at an army post, and Mrs. Russell Mann of Omaha, Neb., a two-time titlist and runner-up last year, will remain on her war job at Rapid City, S. D. Miss Jameson, who also won the 1942 western open, recently returned to San Antonio from Mexico City.

This left the field without a former champion, and at least 11 stars were tabbed as favorites to become the 1943 amateur golfing queen in what shaped up as a wide-open race.

Regarded among the strongest contenders were Catherine Fox of Glen Ridge, N. J., Dot Germain of Philadelphia, Kay Byrne of Rye, N. Y., Margaret Gunther of Memphis, Tenn., and Casey of Mason City, Phyllis Otto of Fargo, N. D., Marjorie Row of Detroit, Mary Agnes Wall of Menominee, Mich., Jeanne Cline of Bloomington, Ill., and Betty Jean Rucker of Spokane, Wash.

Oregon Juke Box Tax Outlawed

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—Oregon's \$10 yearly juke box tax was outlawed Saturday as unconstitutional.

The tax, passed by the last legislature, was discriminatory, since it applied to juke boxes and not phonographs or coin vending machines, said a decision by Circuit Court Judges Alfred P. Dobson, Ashby C. Dickson and Earl C. Latourette.

The judges granted Sol Fox, Portland juke box operator, an injunction, preventing enforcement of the law.
