"This may be MY year." But no, along came two newcomers to this season's women's western competition, Catherine Fox of Glen Ridge, N. J., and Kay Byrne of Rye, N. Y., to dominate the field completely in yesterday's qualifying round...

As it was, she shared runner-up honors with Marjorie Lindsay, the new Illinois state champion from Decatur, and Claire Doran of Cleveland, O.

Betty Jean Rucker of Spokane, Wash., was up among the leaders, with a 79.

Stan Musial, Luke Appling Pace Batters

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals and Luke Appling of the Chicago White Sox still are pacing the batters in the Major leagues, but the batting averages today told a story of greater interest.

Joe Medwick, the once-great clouter of the Cardinals who was batting .272 when the Brooklyn Dodgers sold him to the New York Giants about three weeks ago, now has boosted his average to .304 and is tied for eighth place among the National league hitters.

Thus Medwick already has proved that the Dodgers let him go while he still had considerable punch left in his bat and has enhanced his chances of finishing the season with a .300 average, a mark he never has failed to reach in 11 years in the big league.

Musial added five points to his average during the week, raising it to .345, and took a commanding lead over all rivals for this year's batting championship in the senior circuit.

Appling, the veteran White Sox shortstop, moved to within seven blows of his 2000th hit and bolstered his batting pace to .333, a lift of two points, to continue at the top of the American league.
