

OIL DEALERS MAY DELIVER IN CALIFORNIA

Oil dealers in Oregon may now deliver oil into an area in California without receiving ration stamps, OPA announced today. Since oil is not rationed in California, consumers have not been issued ration coupons and have previously found it impossible to buy oil in Oregon.

Dealers must, however, furnish a duplicate and original of delivery receipts, showing the date, place or transaction, and the amount of oil transferred as well as the name and address of consumer and dealer or primary supplier making the transfer.

The delivery receipt duplicate must then be taken to the war price and ration board and given exchange for an exchange certificate. The original is to be kept in the dealer's files for one year.

Following is a description of the territory affected by the above ruling:

"All the territory embraced in the following area—lying in Siskiyou and Modoc counties, state of California, bounded on the north by the Oregon state line, described as follows: Commencing at the center of the town of Medicine Lake, including all of the town, thence on a straight line in a northwesterly direction through the center of the town of Dorris, including all of the town, thence to the Oregon state line; returning to the center of the town of Medicine Lake, thence on a straight line in an easterly direction to the center of the town of Hackamore, including all of the town; thence on a straight line in a northeasterly direction toward the center of the town of Yocum, Oregon, to the Oregon state line."

Bus Passengers Reported Ill in Poison-Pie Case

EUGENE, Aug. 11 (AP)—Health officials today investigated a report that three bus passengers became ill in Portland after eating pie in a bus depot restaurant here.

The report came as hospitals continued to release patients believed poisoned by eating contaminated cream pies from Cottage Grove last week. Two persons died. Forty others were hospitalized but only 30 remained in hospitals today and all were believed out of danger.

The bus driver, Francis Freeman, said in Portland he had to stop frequently for the passengers, who became violently ill. Two of them were unidentified. One left the bus in Woodburn, the others in Portland.

JAP EVACUEE SENTENCED TO SAN QUENTIN

TULELAKE—Tomatsu Mishida, Japanese evacuee from Newell found guilty in Modoc county court of the theft of an automobile several weeks ago from the Joe L. Jacobs ranch near Malin, has been sentenced to an indeterminate period in San Quentin, according to word reaching here from Alturas. He was found guilty of first degree burglary. The sentence was the second pronounced on Mishida, the first also being for burglary in San Diego in 1938.

Prior to theft of the car, the Japanese entered the R. S. Thompson home at Malin, taking a number of articles and some food. Traveling south, he stopped at the home of a Canby resident where he picked up a rifle and some miscellaneous ammunition.

Government Asks Contractors to Spread Work

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—In an attempt to break a growing manpower shortage, the government appealed to nearly 1000 top contractors today to spread their work through sub-contractors to less critical labor areas.

The army, navy, war production board and the maritime commission sent a joint letter to contractors who have backlogs of \$5,000,000 or more each telling them it is "vital to the war effort" that they shift part of their work to sections of the country which have an adequate labor supply.

Bloody Crime Wave Predicted at Police Chief Meet

DETROIT, Aug. 11 (AP)—Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas department of public safety, told the International Association of Chiefs of Police that "we of the police profession believe that our nation is headed for a crime wave far bloodier and costlier than that of the Capone-Dillinger era."

Col. Garrison, taking part in a group discussion of the effects of war on social standards, warned that "the unbridled youth of today has but a little way to go before he will graduate into the criminal of tomorrow."

Ickes Says Carter Tried to Make Utilities Gift

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Interior Secretary Ickes today accused Representative Carter

(R-Calif.) of trying to get him to join in an attempt to "make a virtual gift to a privately-owned utility company of a federal investment costing the taxpayers many millions of dollars."

Ickes' accusation was contained in a long and sharply-worded answer to a telegram

from Carter charging the interior secretary with "betrayal" of house committee recommendations against use of government funds to construct a transmission line in California to carry power from Shasta dam to Rosville below the Shasta sub-station. Carter said Ickes and other

interior department officials were "disregarding" the committee recommendations by proceeding with the construction and promised they would get a "rude awakening" if they continued what he called an attempt to "overrule the legislative branch."

German Shellfire Pounds Dover Area

LONDON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Big German guns on the French coast opened fire across Dover Strait shortly after 11 a. m. today and shellfire warnings were

sounded in all English towns in the Dover area. Single shells hurtled across the strait at frequent intervals.
