WAR KITCHEN

ARMY KNOWS THE VALUE OF WHOLE GRAIN FOODS

"On my nationwide tour of the army bakers and cooks schools, I enjoyed many an army mess and went behind the scenes to the kitchens to see how they operate," reports Ida Bailey Allen, nationally known food writer and consultant, author of "Double Quick Cooking."
"I found that a whole grain or fortified cereal is a ways served at breakfast. If any cereal is left, it is saved and used within 24 hours—but never in its original form. Army chefs through their own ingenuity frequently add an extra surprise dish based on leftovers."
"At the bakers and cooks school at Camp Lee, Va., they have discovered new ways to use leftover oatmeal suited to the home wartime cuisine. However, when adding extra amount of cereal to the menu, the family will have to be more active physically, to use up excess calories. The instructor at the school warned his class, 'If using leftover oatmeal, reheat, stir well, and add water to avoid lumping. Here are two of the unusual recipes he suggested.'"

Reheat leftover oatmeal. Combine with approximately half as much cream sauce, and add squares of leftover cooked bacon, sliced cooked sausage or shredded dried beef. Serve on toast.
Oatmeal Fruit Pudding
One and one-quarter cups leftover oatmeal, 1 1/2 cups enriched stale bread, 2 1/2 cups milk, 1/3 cup sugar, 2 beaten eggs, 1/3 cup raisins, salt, spice.
Combine the oatmeal and stale bread. Add the milk, sugar, eggs, raisins, salt and spice. Spread an inch deep in an oiled pan. Cover with drained stewed fruit; spread on a second layer of the oatmeal mixture, and bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees F. Serve hot or cold with cream or a sweet sauce.

BREAKFAST: Tomato and fresh lime juice, French toast, honey, fried bologna sausage, coffee, milk.
LUNCH: Oatmeal savory with dried beef, enriched toast, sliced tomatoes, gingerbread, tea, milk.
DINNER: Poached haddock fillets, parsley potatoes, spinach, enriched bread, butter or fortified margarine, lettuce and green pepper salad, sliced peaches, tea, milk.

MOTORISTS ASSURED OF ANTI-FREEZE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—The war production board today assured the nation's motorists an ample supply of anti-freeze for next winter's driving with an order releasing permanent type radiator solutions for 12 western high altitude states. The permanent fluids were made available to any person in Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, North and South Dakota, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming, where motorists must contend with high altitudes which reduce boiling points, and hill driving. Forty-five million gallons of Ethyl alcohol have been allocated for civilian use in anti-freeze mixtures for next winter, and WPB said that supply will be adequate for motorists in the 36 states not affected by the permanent type order.

TIMEKEEPER 'DRUNK' DURING DERAILMENT

SPOKANE, Aug. 12 (AP)—Charles Dougherty, 34, Northern Pacific railroad timekeeper at Heron, Mont., told U. S. Commissioner Raymond F. Kelly Wednesday he was on a "bender" Thursday night when a switch was thrown at Sandpoint, Idaho, in the face of an approaching passenger train. The commissioner ordered a plea of innocent to be entered and bound Dougherty over to federal district court for removal to Idaho. Bond was set at \$2000. Dougherty was arrested at the home of his mother here late yesterday following the filing of a federal complaint in Boise charging him with "attempting to derail, disable and wreck a train moving in interstate commerce."

Oregon News Notes

Crater Lake national park officials reported all entrances and the road around the lake's rim now open for travel but said snow normal for May or June remains at the lake.

Lieut. Cmdr. G. F. DeGrave of the Portland recruiting station said that Oregon last month again led the nation in the enlistment of men for the navy's construction battalions (Seabees). Director Earl K. Nixon of the state department of geology and mineral resources said at Marshfield that development of Coos county's chrome mining will provide a worthy postwar industrial project. . . . Asserting the country is being led into a dictatorship, Senator Holman told the Albany chamber of commerce "that if we do not save this nation at the next election it may be the last election."

The state board of health, making public the results of a three-year survey, said more than four per cent of Oregon school children were found to have defective hearing and that suggested tonsil and adenoid operations helped in some cases.

Japs Confer With Germans on War

NEW YORK, Aug. 12 (AP)—A Japanese broadcast recorded by the federal communications today reported American fliers had attacked the "northern section" of the Kurile island approaches to Japan and warned: "Further appearances of enemy planes from the north are to be expected." In a later broadcast, the Tokyo radio identified the planes as five Liberators and three Flying Fortresses and said the raiders were Aleutian-based.

Highway Maps Sent To County Courts

SALEM, Aug. 12 (AP)—The state highway commission sent to western Oregon county courts today maps on which the courts are asked to outline in detail all of their requested post-war highway projects.

PIE POISON DEATHS BRINGS WARNING

PORTLAND, Aug. 12 (AP)—Deadly poisons may develop in many foods during warm weather, State Health Officer Frederick D. Stricker warned today in connection with the death of two persons and illness of some 70 others from eating cream pies in the Eugene area. Staphylococcus poisoning may occur in chopped meats, sausage, meat pies, custard and cream pastries and salads, he said, and these foods should not be allowed to stand at room temperature for any length of time. Cleanliness in preparation of such foods is essential, he said, and they should be refrigerated if it is necessary to keep them on hand for even a few hours.

Axis Aircraft Found In Sicilian Fields

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 12 (AP)—The allied air command said today that 999 axis aircraft had been recovered from captured Sicilian airfields. Included in the booty were 232 Messerschmitt 109's. The majority of these planes were wrecked when found, but a "surprisingly large number were still serviceable" and were flown to salvage centers, it was said.

CHICKEN HASH

NEW YORK, (AP)—Mrs. Mina Wittman appeared in Long Island city court, charged with keeping six chickens in her backyard without a health department permit. "I suppose the eggs come in handy for the children," said Magistrate Henry A. Soffer. "Eggs!" interjected a patrolman, "Mrs. Wittman has six roosters." "That's different," said the judge, "Five dollars fine, but sentence is suspended provided you eat them within two weeks." America is facing a dangerous emergency on the home front.
