**Fox Plays Germain; Wall To Meet Kirk in Women's Western Amateur Tourney**

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 13 (AP)—It's Catherine Fox vs. Dorothy Germain and Mary Agnes Wall vs. Peggy Kirk in the semi-finals of the women's western amateur golf tournament today at the Evanston Golf club.

Miss Germain had a fine three-under-par medal score for the 14 holes it took her to beat Ann Nasey of Mason City, Ia., 5 and 4, yesterday.

All the other quarter-final efforts required the full 18 holes. Miss Fox defeated Marjorie Row of Detroit, Mich., one up, and Miss Wall won from Jeanne Cline of Bloomington, Ill., by the same margin, being spared an overtime when Miss Cline, putting for a win on the final hole, saw her seven-footer roll around the rim of the cup and then out.

Miss Kirk had a two-up decision against Betty Jean Rucker of Spokane, Wash., but it was closer than that. Miss Kirk was three up at the turn and after halving the next four holes but two in a row leaving only a one-up edge. The next two holes also were halved, but Miss Rucker fired her second shot on the 18th into shrubbery bordering a water hole and lost so many strokes she had to concede.

**Accidents Place Billy the Kid on LA First String; He's Still Doing Fine**

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 13 (AP)—Here's a new saga of Billy the Kid.

He is, for the purpose of exact identification, Billy Sarni. Only 15 years old. Not yet out of high school.

Yet, he's the first string catcher of the Los Angeles Baseball club, a team that is running away from the pack in the Pacific Coast league.

A series of accidents projected the beardless Billy into the spotlight. First, Eddie Fernandez was injured, and a few days later Billy Holm went out with a split finger. The Angels didn't have a catcher.

In desperation President Clarence (Pants) Rowland went to Sarni's parents. They had intervened against flattering offers from various major league clubs—the Pittsburgh Pirates, Boston Red Sox, Cleveland Indians and Chicago Cubs. Billy, they reasoned, should stay at home and in school. But Rowland was persuasive, and, aided and abetted by a \$10,000 bonus, one of the highest ever paid by a class AA baseball club, won over the parents.

Sarni joined the Angels the next day and in his first turn at bat smashed out a home run. If the club was inclined to be jittery about a mere youngster handling the catching duties it changed over quickly.

Billy has played 12 games and is batting a neat .321. He has thrown out 11 runners trying to steal bases. Three times men trying to score have charged into him, bounced back and been tagged out. He's still calling signals, and the veteran Los Angeles pitching staff isn't shaking its collective head at them, either.

## Weekend Fishing Prospects

PORTLAND, Aug. 13—(AP) High mountain lakes and streams and coastal streams will provide anglers their best fishing this weekend, the state game commission's weekly bulletin indicated today.

The county-by-county report: COLUMBIA — Bank fishing along the Columbia river for harvest trout is improving and good catches of catfish, perch and crappies are being made in sloughs.

LANE — Angling only fair. There is a small run of sea trout in the Siuslaw river.

COOS — Fishing poor in northern half of county; fair in southern part, with chinook salmon and bluebacks starting to run in Lower Coquille.

CURRY — Generally poor but Rogue river yielding a few steelhead and steelhead.

LINCOLN — Several limit catches of bluebacks reported in last few days from the Alsea, Siletz and Yaquina rivers. Some also from Beaver and Lower Drift creeks.

TILLAMOOK — Rivers yielding fair catches of bluebacks. A number of limit catches of sea-run cutthroat trout reported from the Big Nestucca.

JOSEPHINE — Rogue river giving up some nice steelhead on files, and Illinois and Applegate rivers nice catches of cutthroat.

CROOK — Very poor.

DESCHUTES — Limit catches being made in Paulina and East lakes both on files and troll; Tood and Elk lakes good, too.

JEFFERSON — Several limit catches reported from Metolius river.

BAKER — Anglers having success in high lakes and Eagle creek.

HOOD RIVER — Some good fishing with flies on lower Hood river. Badger lake and all lakes in Greenpoint area closed.

KLAMATH — Upper Klamath and Agency lakes very good for trolling, with limit catches being taken. Odell, Crescent and Davis lakes and Sprague river also good.

MORROW — Main streams yielding limit catches with grasshoppers best bait.
