Klamath Bus company is the defendant in a damage suit filed by Nancy McCreary. In the complaint the plaintiff asks \$2608 for injuries to one of her hands sustained when a bus driver accidentally closed the door of a bus on it.

The complaint states that on May 9 the plaintiff, along with others, was standing in the aisle of the overcrowded bus when the driver stopped so suddenly that in order to keep from falling the plaintiff grabbed hold of the bus near the door. The driver, evidently not knowing her hand was there, closed the bus door, causing severe cuts, bruises and lacerations on her hand.

British Chiefs

The British chiefs of staff are Gen. ITALY MOVES TO SAVE CITY FROM BOMBS

(Continued from Page One)

Rome station transmitted the Italian News agency announcement of the decision.

It was not immediately clear whether the Italians consulted their German allies before taking the step that was announced today.

Must Cut Lines

To prove acceptable to the United Nations, it was certain that such steps would have to be taken as to sever almost completely the important military supply lines which run from northern Italy to the exposed southern part, to which German armies now are being evacuated from Sicily.

The whole military administration of Italy had been centralized in Rome under the centralized fascist system and remained so after the collapse of Mussolini's regime and the abolition of fascism.

Rid Government

Obviously to satisfy the allies, Italy would have to disperse this crumbling giant of a military government as well as rid Rome of its defenses and military installations.

Even war factories would have to be closed or moved to return Rome to a basis of peace. The allies have charged that Mussolini deliberately built up many of these war industries in the shadow of monuments of Christianity and western civilization, hoping they would be safe thereby.

Investigation Necessary

The allies already have said that before they would accept a declaration of Rome as an open city they would require assurance from an investigation by neutral or protecting powers that all such steps had been carried out.

There was no indication how far such a process may have gone.

The axis broadcasts were recorded by The Associated Press and the ministry of information.

Wait Response

The Italian announcement said the government had been waiting since July 31 for a response from the allies to a communication sent through the Vatican.

In the house of commons on July 28, Ivor Thomas, a labor member of parliament, asked what conditions needed to be fulfilled before Rome could be regarded as an open city.

On this occasion, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden said "if the Italian government approached us in this matter we would consider the question in the circumstances then existing."

The Italian capital has been bombed twice by formations of American bombers, on July 19 network the principal target and August 13, with its railroad each time.

Eliminate Tracks

The elimination of the use of these tracks for the movement of troops and military supplies would be one of the obligations entailed in the declaration of an open city.

Others would be the withdrawal of troops from the city, cessation of manufacture of war supplies and the admission of an allied commission to Rome to see that all obligations were carried out.

LONDON, Aug. 14 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's authority to direct military operations in the Mediterranean is not restricted by the Italian decision to declare Rome an open city, an official British statement said today.

"The unilateral declaration by the Italian government that Rome is being converted into an open city cannot, of course, affect the full liberty of the commander in chief," it said.

Official quarters declined to elaborate on the statement, merely emphasizing that the commander in chief would have full liberty of action.

representative of the supreme command at this front and captor of Orel.

The tall, blond, dapper former czarist officer, now a 49-year-old member of general staff, talked quietly and confidently of the operations. Immediately after the talk, the tents were packed up and moved west to keep pace with the fast moving troops.

Lying in Wait

Before the summer campaign began, Sabennikov said, "the two lines were lying in wait to see who would move first. We were ready, watching for what the Germans would do," he continued.

"We knew of German plans to cut off our Kursk wedge and knew where the concentrations were. Particularly we knew that on the Bryansk front their main concentrations were in Kromi and east of Kromi.

"The Germans began their offensive July 5, south of their concentration, along the railroad in the direction of Malyarchangelsk and Kursk. By July 10 and 11 they put all their main forces in action, hurling them into the attack in these directions. We were ready for this.

Start Counter Blow

"At 3 a. m. on July 12 we started our counteroffensive by concentric blows on Orel from different directions. By July 15, when we broke the front on the Zusha and Oka rivers and farther northwest, we began to feel that the Germans were uneasy. There was some panic in their ranks as we met the divisions which first attacked the Kursk salient.

"For example, the 12th and 8th tank and 36th and 20th motorized divisions and some others were transferred from Kursk to the Orel front. From July 18 to July 20, some divisions were found transferred from France. One tank division was brought from the Minsk-Vitebsk sector and another from Velikie Luki."

Forced to Scatter

"We could feel that the Germans were putting everything possible into the effort to hold the Orel battlefield, but the general situation and deep reaching attacks of the red army both in the direction of Karachev and south from Kursk forced the Germans to scatter their reserves which they did not have placed properly."

miles south of the deepest point of penetration into axis Europe from England," an American military spokesman said, "thus showing that no point in greater Germany now is immune to attack by air."

The text of the U. S. communiqué:

"A large force of Liberator heavy bombers of the 9th U. S. air force attacked an important aircraft production factory and assembly plant at Wiener Neustadt, 27 miles south of Vienna, in daylight on Friday, dropping more than a third of a million pounds of high explosives.

Direct Hits

"Direct hits were scored upon factory buildings and large columns of smoke were seen rising throughout the target area. Scores of bursts were seen among some 400 fighter aircraft parked in rows along the ground.

"Enemy fighter opposition was weak and the ground defenses apparently was taken by complete surprise.

"All of our aircraft are accounted for."

The blow deep into Hitler's southeast European industrial empire was made by hundreds of the giant bombers winging perhaps a record distance from the middle east to attack the hitherto unreachable war plants.

The announcement did not name the base from which the attack was launched, but the flight apparently represented a trip exceeding 2000 miles.

Wellington torpedo bombers, ranging the Aegean sea Thursday night, scored hits on a merchant vessel, the communique added.

firming previous field reports of the German withdrawal, said there no longer was any question but that the Germans' sole aim was to escape to the Italian mainland with as many troops and as much equipment as possible.

Ships Shown

Allied aerial reconnaissance showed that ships crossing the narrow, bomb-tossed Messina strait, were arriving empty on the Sicilian beaches and departing loaded, he said.

The strait, he added, was under constant fire from British light warships and coastal craft and from the fleets of allied bombers shuttling back and forth through that "flak alley" with their loads of 2000-pound blockbusters and cannon and machine-gun ammunition.

Two-Tonnors Dropped

RAF and Canadian Wellingtons dropped two-tonners on ports on both sides of the strait and even laid strings of them along the beaches where enemy infantry was seen wading to the boats.

The overall picture of the narrowing Messina bridgehead began to resemble the German collapse at Cap Bon in Tunisia last May, but with this chief difference: The German retreat was orderly and a weary German rearguard was offering a fierce covering resistance.

More than 1000 tons of bombs, dropped in 30-odd days of raiding, have burst upon Salamaua—a small village of Kuni huts, trading stores and government buildings on the coast fronting the New Guinea jungle and mountains—since the two-pronged Pacific offensive got under way June 30 with Salamaua the immediate objective on the left and the Munda airfield, New Georgia's island, on the right.
