## Fourth Paralysis Victim Claimed in Bremerton Area

BREMERTON, Wash., Aug. 18 (P)—Only a few hours after Kitsap county officials had placed a ban on public meetings to check the spread of infantile paralysis in the area, the disease claimed its fourth victim here within two weeks.

Scott Shirley, 26-year-old Bremerton policeman, who was the latest victim of the disease had been rushed to King county hospital in Seattle and placed in an iron lung earlier yesterday in a vain effort to save his life. Health authorities said a total of 14 cases had been reported up to last night.
