DISCRIMINATING BUYERS SLOW STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP)—Buyers remained ultra-discriminating in today's stock market, and while scattered favorites made fair progress numerous leaders were permitted to loiter in losing territory. Bonds were a shade uneven.

Individual strong spots were aided by pleasing earnings statements and dividends plus the belief of optimists the list was due to shake off its apathy when the dog days end.

Prices, steady at the start, turned mildly regular by mid-day and the near-closing direction was notably foggy.

Transfers were around 500,000 shares.

Occasional advances included Consolidated Laundries, which edged into new high ground for 1943; Twentieth Century-Fox, Union Pacific, Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, Texas Co., Curtiss-Wright, Goodyear and General Motors.

Consolidated Vultee Aircraft slipped into new low ground for the year. Rising power was lacking for U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, N. Y. Central, Northern Pacific, Chrysler, U. S. Rubber, International Harvester, United Air Lines, Pan American Airways, Kennecott, Du Pont, American Telephone and Western Union.

WAR KITCHEN

COOKING FLAVORS REFLECT SECTIONS OF THE COUNTRY

Here are popular American recipes for dried beans, as used in various parts of the country. They come from the valuable new pamphlet just issued by Bureau of Human Nutrition and Home Economics. It's called "Dried Beans and Peas in War Time Meals." You can get it for 5 cents from Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C.

Beans Western (Serves 6)
One onion, chopped, 2 cups tomatoes, salt, pepper, 1 quart cooked beans, parsley.

Brown a chopped onion in a little fat. Add tomatoes. Season with salt and pepper. Bring to a boil and add beans. Simmer 15 to 20 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley and serve hot.

Hopping John, Southern Style (Serves 6)
One ham bone or knuckle, 2 quarts water, 1 cup dried peas or beans, 1 cup washed rice, salt, pepper.

Cook the ham bone or knuckle in the 2 quarts of water for 2 hours. Then add the peas or beans that have been soaked overnight in cold water,

and cook until almost tender. Remove ham bone, add rice, and salt and pepper. Boil gently about 20 minutes, or until the rice is soft and the liquid almost cooked away. Serve hot.

Mexican Style Beans (Serves 6)

Two cups beans (pintos preferred), 1 1/2 quarts of water, few bacon rinds, clove garlic, dried red chili pepper or chili powder, salt.

Soak the beans overnight in the 1 1/2 quarts water. The next day bring them to a boil and simmer for about 3 hours. When the beans start to simmer, add the bacon rinds. After 2 hours, add garlic, minced, the chili pepper or chili powder, and salt to taste. The cooked juice should be thick. If desired, mash the beans and add grated cheese.

MENU (Eat the Basic 7 Every Day)

BREAKFAST: Sliced oranges, cracked wheat cereal, raisin toast, butter or fortified margarine, coffee, milk.

LUNCH: Stuffed green peppers, cheese sauce, whole wheat bread, butter or fortified margarine, whole peaches, tea, milk.

DINNER: Fruit cup, Hopping John, southern style, buttered beet tops, enriched hard rolls or French or Italian bread, lettuce and tomato salad, blackberry pie, tea, milk.

WHEAT

CHICAGO, Aug. 19 (AP)—Grains closed with minor changes today after moving up aggressively in early trading when commercial interests bought wheat and commission houses took to the buying side of rye. The early upturn ran into fairly heavy selling resistance and the market subsequently reversed itself.

The September rye contract ran into most of the selling, dropping more than a cent below the previous close at times. Deferred months exhibited more strength. Elevator interests were active in the wheat pit, buying September and selling December futures. Trade was active early, but dwindled later in the day.

At the close wheat was 1-1/2c higher, September \$1.44-1.45, December \$1.46-1.47, oats were 1c lower to 1c higher, September 70-1/2c, and rye 1c lower to 1c higher, September 98-1/2c.

BULK PURCHASE OF DRY BEANS TO BE STARTED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—The government is expected to announce soon a program under which it would in effect purchase the bulk of the 1943 crop of dry edible beans and peas and resell 40 per cent for civilian consumption at a loss of about 70 cents a hundred pounds. The other 60 per cent would be used for war purposes.

The combined production of beans and peas has been forecast at about 33,000,000 100-pound bags.

Such a program is necessary, officials of the war food administration (WFA) said, because prices promised growers under a price support program are, in the case of most classes of beans and peas, higher than the ceilings established by the office of price administration (OPA).

Dodgers to Hold Baseball Tryouts

SAN MATEO, Calif., Aug. 19 A tryout camp offering young players an opportunity to determine whether they have the ability to play baseball professionally will be conducted at Central park here by the Brooklyn Dodgers September 8 through September 11.

Arrangements for the tryouts were announced today by Branch Rickey Jr., director of minor league clubs for the Dodgers. Boys 16 or older are invited to report at Central park here for trials, Rickey said. To receive tryouts they need only to present themselves at the field at 9 o'clock the morning of Wednesday, September 8, bringing their baseball shoes, gloves and uniforms. No fee is charged; however, out-of-town boys must finance their trips to San Mateo and living expenses while here.

Carl Huson Wins President's Cup In Close Match

The annual President's cup awarded each year at the Reames Country club, for the winner of the President's golf tournament, was won this year by Carl Huson. Huson defeated Lee Smith one up on 19 holes in one of the closest matches of the year. Runner up to Huson and Smith was Tom Towey who was earlier defeated by both finalists 3 and 2.

Club championships will be played off this week-end with pairings being arranged in the first and second flights by the club pro, Carl Lindgren. This will be a scratch tournament.

French Commander Killed in Action

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 19 (AP)—General Louis-Marie Koeltz, commander of the French nineteenth corps, has been killed in action, it was disclosed today.

The death of the general, whose troops fought alongside the British first army in the Tunisian campaign, was disclosed with announcement of a posthumous Legion of Merit award.

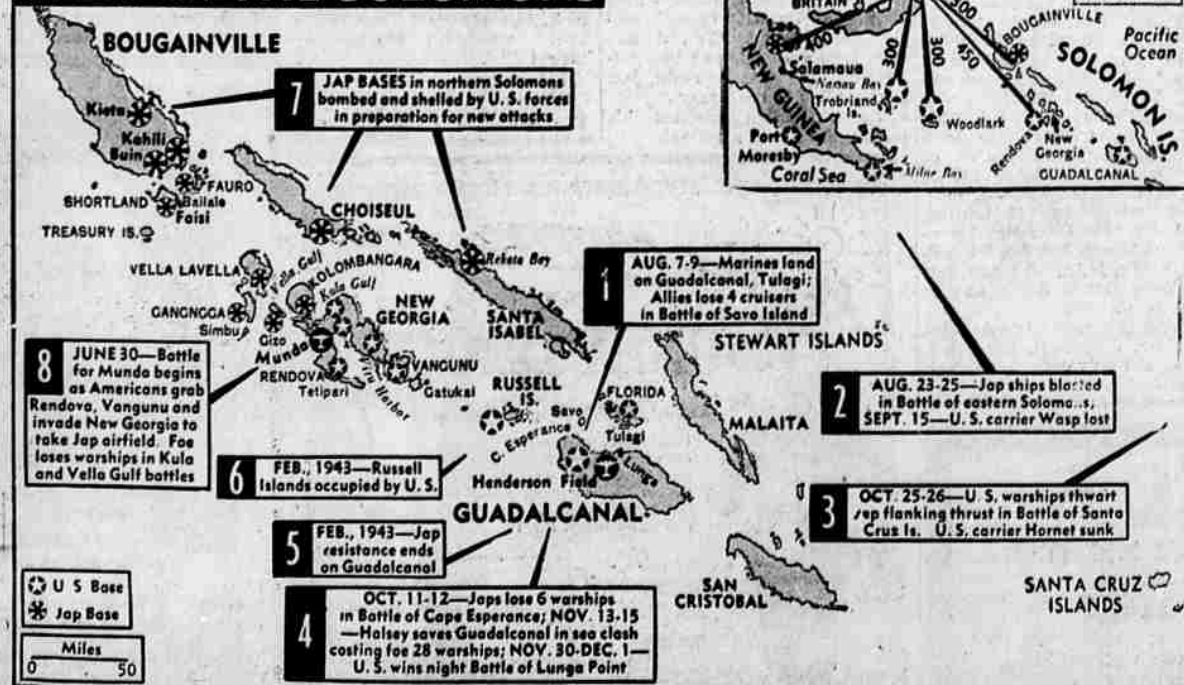
