

FRED HAMILTON PROMOTED TO HEAD OFFICE

Fred Hamilton, for the past five years Klamath area manager for Shell Oil Co., has been transferred to the head office of the company in San Francisco, and will leave on September 1 to take over his new duties. He will be succeeded here by E. G. Newbill, now Astoria manager for Shell. Newbill was formerly a salesman in the Klamath Falls office and was later manager for Shell at Merrill.

Hamilton's new position will be in the office of operations and planning, which has charge of planning new operations and overhauling existing ones in the entire Pacific divisions. It rates as a district promotion.

Mrs. Hamilton will remain in Klamath Falls until living accommodations can be found in war-crowded San Francisco.

CARDS RECEIVED FROM PRISONERS

Two more cards from Japanese prison camps in the Philippine islands have come to the attention of the newspaper. These cards were sent from Klamath county boys who are prisoners of war.

Sergeant Clifford Clegg, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. S. Clegg of 2429 Orchard avenue, sent word to his parents that his health is excellent, and that he is uninjured and well. He sends his love to everyone and it is signed in his own handwriting.

This is the first that the Cleggs have heard for 22 months. Sergeant Clegg also has a brother, Maynard E. Clegg, who is a second lieutenant in the air corps.

Mrs. Helen Lebow of Bonanza has received a card from her brother, Private William R. Roberts. He states that his health is good. He is under medical treatment and is improving. He gives his best regards to all of his brothers and sisters. It is the first word from Private Roberts since October, 1941.

General Patch To Direct Central Oregon Maneuvers

FORT LEWIS, Wash., Aug. 20 (P)—Major General Alexander M. Patch Jr., commanding general of the fourth corps, who has been named director of the forthcoming large scale army maneuvers in Oregon, announced today that the maneuvers will be held from September 14 through to November 7.

This postpones the opening of the maneuvers, originally scheduled for September 7 to October 30, one week. The change was made, he explained, because of an expansion of original plans. The maneuvers are being held in the newly formed northwest maneuver area, which has been set aside by the war department to make possible large scale maneuvers similar to those which have been held in Tennessee.

Rationing Calendar

War Price and Rationing Board, Main and Esplanade streets. Office hours daily, 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.; Saturday, 9:30 a. m. to 2 p. m. Phone 8161 for all information.

All applications must be MAILED IN to the war price and rationing board at Main and Esplanade, and not brought in in person.

August 31—Expiration date for red stamps T, U, V, W, Stamp X valid Aug. 22 to Oct. 2.

Book 3
September 12—Starting date for use of brown stamps for meat, fats, oils, butter and cheese. Point value to be same as red stamps but will always expire on the Saturday nearest the end of the month.

September 20—Blue stamps R-S-T expire. Stamps U-V-W valid Sept. 1 to Oct. 20.

GASOLINE

September 21—No. 7 stamps in A book, each good for four gallons, valid through this date.

SHOES

October 31—Stamp No. 18, war ration book 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Family stamps are interchangeable.

FUEL OIL

September 30—Fuel oil—5th period coupon expires. Fixed value coupons expire on date listed on coupon sheet.

STOVES

August 24—Beginning date of cooking and heating stove rationing. Covering all new stoves burning coal, wood, oil or gas for domestic use, with a few exceptions.

TIRES

"C" book holders must have tires inspected every three months with at least 45 days elapsing between inspections.

"B" book holders must have tires inspected every four months with at least 60 days elapsing between inspections.

"A" and "D" book holders must have tires inspected every six months with at least 90 days elapsing between inspections.

September 30—Next inspection deadline for A book holders.

Southern Association Features Wild Game; Nashville Wins

ATLANTA, Aug. 20 (P)—The baseball merry-go-round got a big ride here last night as Nashville scored 26 runs and Atlanta 13 in a wild Southern Association game.

Nashville players clouted 29 hits off five Atlanta pitchers, while the Georgia team got 14. First Baseman Mel Hicks of Nashville batted in seven runs.

There were seven doubles, four triples, two home runs, two players hit by a pitcher, one wild pitch, one passed ball, and ten errors.

The slugfest lasted two hours and 25 minutes.

OPA REVISES CEILINGS ON 'AS IS' TRUCKS

Ceilings for "as is" trucks and commercial vehicles have been revised by the OPA to adjust the maximum prices for second hand vehicles to bring them in line with values of trucks in better than average condition, it was announced today.

In order to allow more favorable prices for "good clean" trucks, the percentage tables for computing prices have been revised. Instead of allowing 90 to 26 per cent of the value when new, with prices spread over a 6-year period, the tables have been revised to provide for top prices, ranging from 92 to 33 per cent over a ten-year period.

Formerly the warranty allowance was 5 per cent of the "as is" price, but it has been changed to 11 to 17 per cent higher than these ceilings. The cost of repair to place the vehicle in a warranty condition is included in this price. Formerly 5 per cent was allowed in addition to the price for rebuilding and reconditioning.

MAILING TIME FOR PACKAGES SET UP

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (P)—The war department announced last night that the time for mailing packages to prisoners of war and civilian internees in the far east has been advanced from September 15 to August 27 because of a change in the sailing time for the exchange ship Gripsholm.

The announcement said that all persons who had received labels from the provost marshal authorizing packages to be sent should have them in New York by midnight of August 27.

Italian Army Said Disintegrating

MADRID, Aug. 20 (P)—Reports from Italy, brought here during the last three days by passengers arriving in planes and one group which crossed through France, indicate that the Italian army is not only anxious to quit fighting but is now actually disintegrating, with thousands of desertions.

These reports add that strikes were spreading throughout northern Italy and that peace demonstrations which started in the north are now extending through central Italy.
