

# TWIN PUSH ON NAZIS SLOWED BY TERRAIN

man bulletin asserted. The communiqué said 486 Russian tanks and 81 planes were destroyed yesterday.

**Stiff Resistance**  
On the Kharkov front in the Ukraine, some 240 miles south of Bryansk, Russian troops were said to be encountering stiff resistance in attempts to overcome German defenses based on hills forming a natural line around the city.

Action in this sector was sharpening in the face of mounting German counterattacks, while the red army air force pounded heavily at bases in the enemy rear in an endeavor to cripple supply routes.

**German Wiped Out**  
Some 2400 Germans were wiped out and 30 villages captured as the red army smashed forward on the west, northwest and southeast sides of Kharkov, a soviet communiqué said. Gains of three to seven miles were reported despite repeated German counterattacks.

One escape route — to the southwest along the line of the Krasnodar railway — remained open to the defense garrison, but a Pravda dispatch said the German high command had ordered a fight to the death within the city.

In a parallel drive on the German base of Bryansk, 240 miles to the north, red troops seized more than 20 villages after dislodging the Germans, from several fortified positions and were reported less than 20 miles from the city.

Meanwhile disorders were reported mounting, travelers bringing word of clashes between patriots and German soldiers in Odense.

Reports reaching Malmo said that 16 German soldiers were killed in riots which forced the authorities to clamp down an 8 p. m. curfew on most of the Funen island district, Danish soldiers have been stationed in that area.

**Fighters Downed**  
The Fortresses accounted for 16 enemy fighters and their escorts knocked down 18, the bulletin declared. Good bombing results were reported on both targets.

Four bombers and two fighters were lost in these raids, but the pilot of one was saved.

U. S. Marauders and RAF Mitchells earlier in the day had blasted Nazi airfields at Poix and Amiens-Glissy in France. The Americans spearheaded the thrust, with the British planes following with a second pounding of the airfields at Poix.

**Important Base**  
Gilze-Rijen, one of the two targets in the raids on Holland, is an important operational base in a strong German fighter plane belt, while Vlissingen is a big base used for the German transport aircraft.

Emahiser denied that he advised Layton to repeat his confession to the grand jury.

With the trial jury still out District Attorney Bruce Spaulding said Layton's appearance before the grand jury had been approved by Circuit Judge Frank Peters at Hillsboro.

State Police Capt. Wayne Gurdane denied earlier that Layton had been mistreated at any time since his arrest.

ies, chain stores, insurance companies, and all firms doing business here, will be asked to allot bond purchases to Klamath county. The government is seeking \$15,000,000,000 in the Third War loan.

"I know we are taking on an immense job," said General Chairman Hall. "It will take the solid support of the entire community to put it over. But Klamath has a way of coming through, and it will come through again. The Elks feel honored that they were asked to take the lead in this huge patriotic undertaking. We will do our best, and we ask every citizen to give us his help."

the most of the topography. The communiqué told of American jungle troops in the Solomons going after pockets of enemy resistance Thursday on atolls and islets only a mile or so west of the Munda airfield on New Georgia which was wrested from the Japanese August 5. On August 15, the Americans occupied Vella Lavella island, 45 miles northwest of Munda, and the communiqué announcing its capture pointedly explained that the Japanese sea supply line to both New Georgia and Kolombangara had been severed.

Despite that, the Japanese have remained on small isles near Munda, even shelling the field, making necessary the liquidation campaign which today's communiqué disclosed. They also are hanging on at Bairoko harbor. The communiqué indicated they are continuing efforts to sneak in supplies at night to the imperiled garrison there, reporting that PT boats dispersed barges Thursday in the north New Georgia vicinity.

Sensing the peril posed by American occupation of Vella Lavella, the Japanese tried to land a counter-invasion force by destroyer-escorted barges early Wednesday but were repulsed.

When he says that, he's TALKING TO THE ENEMY, seeking to shake nerves.

To US, he says: "The war is going very well indeed, but will last long and be hard." He's telling us not to let down in our efforts.

(We on the home front have to be "handled," you know.)

**BOTH** Eden and Hull are either at Quebec or are going to be, indicating political as well as military planning.

It is suggested, although not flatly stated, that Stalin is being kept informed as to the progress of the planning. There are hints (or maybe guesses) that Eden will return by way of Moscow in order to take the news to Stalin personally.

**AS** to all these hints and rumors and suggestions of something big impending just about ready to be touched off, remember how long this sort of talk preceded our invasion of Sicily.  
Then BANG! We were off. War is like that.
