

MYER DENIES RELEASING OF 'SUBVERSIVES'

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (AP)—Charges by a house subcommittee that the war relocation authority (WRA) had neglected to exercise "proper safeguards" for the national security in releasing Japanese from its camps brought a prompt denial today from WRA Director Dillon S. Myer.

"We have released no dangerous subversives," Myer told newsmen. "We let the record stand for itself. There now are 18,000 persons on seasonal and indefinite leave from the relocation centers, and there has been not a single report of a subversive act by any one of them."

A Dies subcommittee on un-American activities reported yesterday that WRA had released 23 members of Butoku-Kai which it described as a subversive youth section of the Black Dragon society of Japan.

The congressional group, headed by Rep. Costello (D-Calif.), said the purpose of Butoku-Kai was to "enhance the spirit of Japanese military virtue" in America, and that many of its 10,000 members were instructed "in the military arts."

The committee, after a protracted investigation in California and elsewhere, made these recommendations:

1. That the WRA's "belated announcement of its intentions of segregating the disloyal from the loyal Japanese" be made effective immediately.
2. That a board of representatives from the WRA and the various intelligence agencies, including the FBI, be constituted with full powers to investigate evacuees and to pass finally on their applications for release.
3. That WRA inaugurate a thorough-going program of Americanization for Japanese remaining in the centers.

Salem Police Work On Mysterious Death Of Shipyard Worker

SALEM, Aug. 24 (AP)—Police attempted today to solve the death of Stephen Jay Billings, 33, shipyard worker, who died late yesterday from a blow on the back of his head.

His body was found on the porch at the home of his mother, Mrs. Ethel C. Billings, who was believed to be at Newport. The body was found by Barbara Lutz, a neighbor girl.

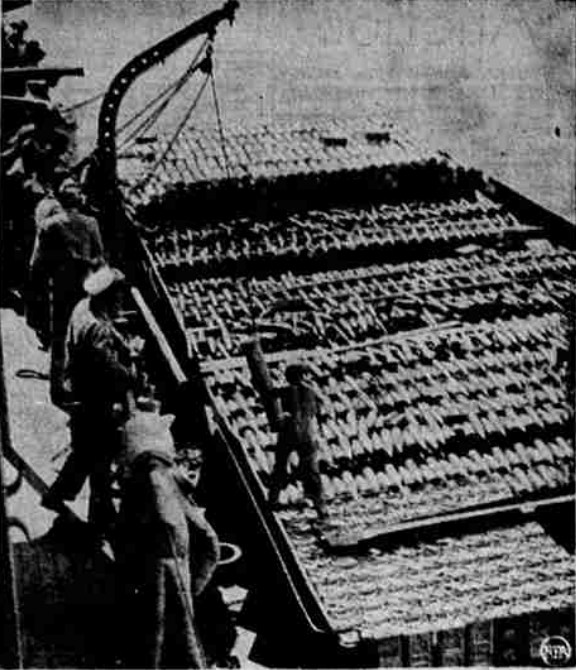
Billings had been working at the Swan Island shipyard in Portland, and was believed to have lived in a barracks there. He was divorced from his wife.

Valorous Soldier Risks Death to Save 'Queenie'

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 24 (AP)—In the next list of awards for valor you may find the name of Private Normal Clark, of Hammond, Ind., who risked meeting a terrible death in the Mediterranean not long ago.

His act of courage wasn't performed in combat, it had nothing to do with military objectives and won't affect the course of the war in any way.

He put his life in the balance to save the life of a dog.

Queenie wasn't much of a dog—just a mongrel which trotted aboard an American troopship one day and took possession of the ship from the bridge to the galley, the way a dog will do.

The transport was riding a few feet from another ship a while back when there was an explosion aboard the latter vessel. Oil gushed out over the ocean, spreading quickly. A jet of flame shot out from the side

of the stricken vessel. Fire threatened to engulf both ships.

In the excitement Queenie fell overboard.

They didn't see her until the transport started pulling away. She was coated with sticky black oil, struggling and choking in the water. They tried to block Private Normal Clark when he headed for the rail, yelling to him that the whole ocean would be a mass of flames any minute.

He dove in and plowed through the thick mass of oil and reached Queenie and the dog clawed her way atop his shoulder. It took the sailors nearly half an hour to get them back on board the transport.

The men want Private Normal Clark to have a medal for valor—and he's pretty certain to get one.

Local Police Nab Man Wanted In Arizona Murder

Sterling Redden, wanted on murder and jail break charges at Safford, Ariz., was picked up by city police Sunday night and later transferred to the county jail. Redden admitted his identity to officers here and signed a waiver of extradition.

Redden was arrested in Alturas some time ago on a drunk charge and his finger prints, as a matter of routine, sent to the FBI. A few days later Redden was released, but a short time after it was learned that the man was wanted on murder and jailbreak charges in Arizona. Descriptions of Redden were sent out and city police here recognized and arrested the man.

CHANGES MADE IN RURAL ROUTES

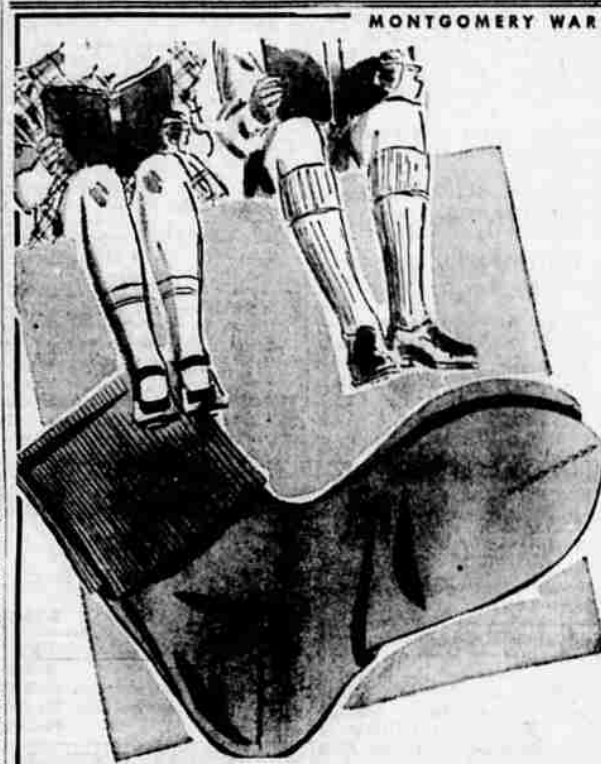
Ballot Title Ready For Liquor Law
