Air War

In the air, far-ranging Liberators of Lt. Gen. George Kenney's command added new proof that roundtrip flights of more than 2000 miles can become routine. They flew to Kendari, Dutch Celebes, which had been raided on at least two other occasions, and bombed the airdrome and town.

Only last week, Liberators blasted Japan's nickel mining center on Celebes' Gulf of Bone. Macassar, on Celebes' west coast, also has been attacked, and the Liberators have ranged even beyond to hit the enemy oil port of Balikpapan on Borneo three times.

Urban Population Up In Census Figures

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24 (P) — America's civilian metropolitan population increased approximately 1,690,000, or 2.5 per cent between April 1, 1940, and March, 1943, the census bureau reported today.

Thus 68,467,329, or 53.4 per cent of the nation's 128,231,363 civilians, are urban or suburban dwellers, contrasted to 50.9 per cent three years ago.

war effort of the United States and Britain "spreads and deepens."

The Pacific decisions reached here on the historic heights above the St. Lawrence, they said, can only emerge in action.

"It may, however, be stated," the allied chiefs said, "that the military discussions of the chiefs of staffs turned very largely upon the war against Japan and the bringing of effective aid to China."

Soong Present

T. V. Soong, Chinese foreign minister, was here representing Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek in the latter stages of the war councils.

Mr. Roosevelt and Churchill said that in the field of the conflicts against the Japanese, as in the European theatre, they had received and approved unanimous recommendations of their combined chiefs of staff.

"Agreement was also reached," they said, "upon the political issues underlying or arising out of the military operations."

Styles "Offensive," Says Catholic Union

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 24 (P) — The National Catholic Women's union says that the styles of women's clothes in the last few years and especially since Pearl Harbor, "have become progressively more offensive."

The union in resolutions adopted at its annual meeting yesterday asserted that "costumes for sport and play are shamelessly brief. Skirts have long been raised above the limits dictated by modesty and common ordinary decency; fabrics are diabolically employed to create a sensual allure."

She is the former Louise Mercer of Seattle.

Last February, he landed in a South Pacific country and shortly afterward met his future wife when he stepped into a ham-

burger shop and asked for a package of cigarettes.

The girl behind the counter had none for sale but when she heard that Rhoads was to drive his truck all that night she went into the kitchen and brought him her half-empty pack.

This was the start of a friendship which later blossomed into love. The couple became engaged in April and were married by a justice of the peace on June 15.
