

Pride Goads Yankees to Try for Twelfth Victory; Awkward A's Finally Win

The heat is on the New York Yankees today. It isn't pennant pressure but the pressure of pride which is bearing heavily on the American league champions.

They need to win both ends of a doubleheader at Detroit to win the seven-game series and extend their record performance to victory in 12 consecutive series.

This is a feat that, so far as historians know, never was accomplished even by the famous Yankees of other years and is dearly sought by the 1943 club, which often has been described as the weakest ever managed by Joe McCarthy.

The Yankees took the first half of a double bill yesterday 2-1 with Spurgeon (Spud) Chandler pitching four-hit ball for his 18th triumph against three defeats.

But the Tigers came back magnificently to win the second game 3-1 as Virgil (Fire) Trucks pitched a three-hitter. He would have had a shutout except for Nick Etten's 13th homer in the fifth inning.

The Yankees have the only record-breaking streak now in existence in the American league. The Philadelphia Athletics had one of a different kind going strong until last night, but after losing the first part of a doubleheader to the Chicago White Sox 6-5 for their 20th straight setback, the A's finally submitted to the law of averages and won the second game 8-1.

The Boston Red Sox of 1906 and the Athletics of 1916 were the only other American league clubs to drop 20 straight.

Washington strengthened its grasp on second place by beating the St. Louis Browns 10-4 as Clayton Heffner pitched four-hit ball and Stan Spence and Bob Johnson led a 14-hit attack with homers.

The Boston Red Sox and Cleveland Indians divided, with Cleveland capturing the first game 5-2 and the Red Sox surging back to a 7-0 shutout with Heber (Dick) Newsome producing a two-hit masterpiece.

In the National league the St. Louis Cardinals edged out the Boston Braves 1-0 when Stan Musial tripled a run home in the tenth. It was the 18th victory against seven defeats for Mort Cooper.

Truett (Rip) Sewell was given his 19th success against five defeats as the Pittsburgh Pirates took a slugging session from the Brooklyn Dodgers 9-6 in a two-

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College Stars, Redskins Kick 1943 Grid Season

Sellout Throng to See Football Year Prevue Tonight in Dyche Stadium

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 25 (P)—It's kickoff time for the 1943 football season. And the college all-stars and a professional team—this year the Washington Redskins—are providing the usual dramatic and colorful start tonight as they have for the last 10 years.

It's a new setting, Dyche stadium on the Northwestern university campus, and a smaller crowd, although a sellout throng of 50,000, that will herald the opening of the new campaign. The game was moved here from Chicago's Soldier Field, site of the previous nine games and where 101,000 saw last year's contest—but it's the same big show.

This is the football season prelude—the first two teams of the year to face each other in formal competition.

Despite the smaller attendance the game is expected to gross approximately \$200,000, a record for the series. Proceeds will go to the Chicago servicemen's centers.

This is the first appearance of the Redskins in the all-star game since 1938, when the Washington club was defeated 28 to 16. The professionals have won every one of the intervening contests.

light game abbreviated to six innings by darkness.

A two-run ninth-inning homer by Buster Maynard gave the New York Giants an 8-7 decision over the Chicago Cubs in the first game of a doubleheader, but Ed Henyewski pitched a four-hitter to win the nightcap 6-1 for the Bruins and Cincinnati completed a sweep of its series at Philadelphia with a 4-2 triumph in a night game.

A dozen national championships were up for decision as the field, slashed somewhat by gasoline rationing and traveling restrictions, blazed away at 200 16-yard plays in the opening event.

The Pelicans defeated Grant 15 to 0 here last fall, but the game was closer than the score indicates.

According to present plans, the Grant game will figure importantly in the Third War Loan drive. It comes in the middle of that biggest bond-selling event in local history, and plans are being made to feature bond sales in connection with the big football game.

Jack Linman, Frank Ramsey and John Houston, all members of the Elks lodge, are in charge of the bond sale feature of the game, and further announcements will be made in a short time.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (P)—The only thing that will keep Henry Armstrong in the ring after the first of the year is a shot at the world lightweight championship. And it has to be the whole apple pie—not one of those part-time baubles that'll be recognized only in the way stations.

The fight game's answer to perpetual motion has piled up a neat \$150,000 in his year-long comeback and he figures that should keep him in those fancy sports jackets and house slippers for a day or two.

What's more, he'll pick up better than a ham sandwich from his fight Friday night with Ray Robinson in Madison Square Garden.

"All in all," Henry the hammer explained today, "I'd say I'll have a dozen more fights at the most before the end of the year. If the lightweight contenders could get their championship straightened out by then, I'd stay around for one more crack at it. By that I mean that if I fight for the title, I want it to be the whole crown, not just a piece of it."

Chase Grabs Ten Rounder From McDaniels

SEATTLE, Aug. 25 (P)—Jimmy McDaniels of Los Angeles learned all over again last night that time-tested adage of the sports arena: The odds are with the good big fellow when he meets a good little guy.

Jack Chase, California's sharp-shooting middleweight champion, with a 10-pound weight advantage, won a 10-round decision over McDaniels despite flurries which gave the aggressive Los Angeles scrapper an even break in the eighth and tenth rounds. Chase weighed 155 to McDaniels' 145.

Chase won a unanimous decision of the referee and judges. He established his margin by clever boxing, by keeping his left persistently in McDaniels' face and by coming through toe-toe exchanges without slowing up.

War Hunting In Coonskin Cap Class

Nimrods Go A-Hunting to Put Meat in Family Larder, Says Fish, Wildlife Men

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (P)—War has put hunting back on its coonskin cap, long tom rifle basis with power-thrifty, sharp-shooting nimrods going a-gunning—not for sport—but to fill the family larder with fresh meat.

For, take it from the interior department's fish and wildlife service, hunters are making a substantial contribution toward easing the meat shortage.

They bagged a total of 255,404,000 pounds in the 1942-43 season and in terms of the coupon beef values that represents 3,084,848,000 rationing points.

The war production board (WPB) last night upped the quota of rifle and shotgun shells to be made available to farmers and ranchers for use against "predatory animals and game birds now threatening crops and herds in certain parts of the country."

Those who take advantage of the order will get an extra 100 rounds of 22 calibre cartridges, 20 rounds of center fire rifle ammunition and 25 rounds of shotgun shells of any gauge in addition to their regular quarterly quotas.

Simultaneously, WPB advised sportsmen hunters that they would be allowed 50 rounds of 22 cartridges, 20 rounds of center fire ammunition and 25 rounds of shotgun shells after the needs of the farmers and ranchers have been met.

First Pelican Football Squad Meeting Set

Actual practice for the Pelicans is slated to start September 3.
