RUBBER, RAIL MOTOR, STEEL SHARES FLOAT

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP)—Rubber, motor, rail and steel shares enjoyed what buoyancy there was in the stock market today, and even they at times eased from their best levels.

Dealings in the cases of many of the usually prominent issues were scant. Volume ran around 450,000 shares.

Prices were mixed at the start, improved slightly toward noon and a majority of leaders held fractional gains near the close but the upward tendency failed to attract much backing.

Ahead most of the time were Southern Pacific, Southern Railway, New York Central, Goodrich, Goodyear, U. S. Rubber, General Motors, Chrysler, Bethlehem, Youngstown, DuPont, Sears Roebuck, Montgomery Ward, Consolidated Edison, General Electric, Anaconda and Kennecott.

Supported in the curb were Cities Service, Suray Oil, Colonial Airlines, Cuban Atlantic Sugar and Pioneer Gold, Utah Power and Light preferred slipped badly after directors took no action on dividends.

Rail bonds drew support.

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (AP)—Grains retreated toward the close today after advancing as much as 2 cents in rye on a government weather report noting deterioration of the corn crop in some sections of the country. Rye and oats held part of their gains, but wheat slumped to around the previous close.

Profit-taking was considered mainly responsible for the setback near the close. Reports that only scattered small lot sales were taking place in the flour market dampened the enthusiasm in the wheat pit. Buying of oats and rye came mainly through commission houses and, despite the strong underdone, trade was not active.

At the close wheat was 1c lower to 1c higher, September \$1.44, oats were 1-1c higher, September 72c, and rye was unchanged to 1c higher, September \$1.01-1.

Danish Riots Flare Against Germans

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 25 (AP)—Increasing difficulty in subduing a "people's revolt" against the German occupation caused six Danish cities to be placed under a state of emergency today, it was reported here Tuesday.

Riots between the Danes and German soldiers and more sabotage against transport lines and factories serving the nazis resulted in emergency decrees for Aarhus, Aalborg, Odense, Svendborg, Middelfart and Korsor, said dispatches reaching the Swedish press.

KLAMATH TO SHARE IN LOG SALE PROCEEDS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—Eighteen Oregon counties will share \$950,423 in revenues from the sale of timber produced on 2,500,000 acres of Oregon and California railroad grant lands in 1942, the department of interior announced today.

The timber acreage is managed by the department on a sustained yield basis, and produced 415,000,000 board feet of lumber during the year.

Of the total payment, \$680,363 represented the counties' share in timber sale proceeds, and \$270,060 was in lieu of back taxes the counties would have received from the lands, which reverted to federal ownership when the Oregon and California failed to live up to provisions of its land grant.

In payments by counties: Benton, \$35,832; Clackamas, \$51,412; Columbia \$16,677; Coos, \$82,380; Curry, \$4577; Douglas, \$253,708; Jackson, \$169,052; Josephine, \$78,447; Klamath, \$17,421; Lane, \$149,933; Lincoln, \$4768; Linn, \$32,681; Marion, \$15,994; Multnomah, \$7543; Polk, \$27,594; Tillamook, \$8287; Washington, \$6479; Yamhill, \$3632.
