

All Fathers Face Army Draft, Says McNutt in Speech

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—American draft-age fathers—no matter when their children were born—today have this cold fact confronting them:

They face army induction. War Manpower Commissioner Paul McNutt in a radio broadcast last night adhered to the policy he announced weeks ago: that after October 1 all fathers are open to the draft.

Policy Outlined

That policy is: henceforth any deferment fathers can expect depends upon how close their job is tied into the war, that the first fathers to go into the army will be those in jobs McNutt considers non-deferrable or unessential.

It is important to emphasize this because future deferment depends upon occupation, even though a man's children were born before last September 15, making him a pre-Pearl Harbor father. But even that is no guarantee against army service.

Benefits

Recently we asked a top WMC official what benefits a father could expect from shifting from a non-deferrable to an essential activity. He said:

"Benefit? Benefit? We should not like to think in those terms. We prefer to think that 99.99/100 per cent of American fathers are thinking of the war first and themselves afterwards."

Think of Families

But we assume that a number of fathers, no matter what their interest in the war, are also thinking in terms of their families; that they are thinking of what they can do to help the war and also of the effect of what they do upon their families.

This was the heart of McNutt's order several weeks ago and the one which, he made clear, still stands:

Previous Ban

Until now there has been a ban on drafting of fathers whose children were born before last September 15—fathers whose children were born after that date were in draft terms not fathers at all—no matter what job they held.

But after October 1 that ban is lifted: Fathers failing to shift from non-deferrable jobs into jobs related to the war will be placed first on the draft list.

Clarification

This, not as simple as it sounds, needs clarification: McNutt issued a number of job classifications: Those he considered so unimportant to the war effort he called non-deferrable, that is, carrying no claim to deferment from the draft; and jobs that were badly needed in the war. He called the latter essential or critical jobs.

Presumably—since final decision in all cases is left to the local draft boards—those essential or critical jobs carry draft deferment.

Not Automatic

But even that kind of classification doesn't automatically carry deferment, but will depend in all cases upon the location. For instance:

Suppose a father shifted from a position as gambler—which is on the non-deferrable list—into a job in a war plant.

If that particular job—even though it was so unskilled as lifting scrap metal from the floor to a truck—was in an area where any kind of labor is short, the draft board might defer the one-time gambler on the grounds he was essential to the war.

But if that one-time gambler shifted into the war plant scrap-lifting job in an area where labor was plentiful and an average man or woman was available to take over his duties, the draft board might decide to send him to the army.
