

CONTEST FOR OREGON GREEN GUARDS TOLD

An opportunity for the young people of Klamath county who are members of the Green Guard to compete for valuable war bonds or merchandise prizes was revealed here today by Vernon Moore, county Keep Oregon Green chairman.

This statewide contest will be open to every Green Guard member, the county chairman pointed out, and information including contest rules is being mailed to every registered guard from Salem headquarters of KOG by Edward Campbell, Green Guard state director. Contest closes September 15.

Green Guards who enter the contest will be judged on the basis of points awarded for activities during the summer. Points will be awarded for new members obtained and for summer work.

First prize will be bicycles to the outstanding boy and girl guard, or \$37.50 cash value in war bonds.

Second prize will be a dressing table for the girl and a set of golf clubs for the boy, or \$25 in war bonds and stamps.

Third prize will be sleeping bags for boys and girls. There will be three of these offered, and here again you may take your prizes of \$12.50 in war savings stamps.

Fourth prize will be 20 Green Guard sweaters with the Green Guard shield, to be awarded both boys and girls, or you may take \$5 in war savings stamps.

Fifth prize will be 40 Green Guard sport shirts or \$2.50 in war savings stamps. These will be awarded both boys and girls.

Sixth prize will be 100 Green Guard "T" shirts or \$1 in war saving stamps. These are for both boys and girls.

To be eligible for first or second prize, a guard must write a 500-word essay on the subject "Why We Keep Oregon Green," and send this in, along with completed manual and service record. Also send the names and addresses of new members secured. These essays will also count toward the score for third and fourth prizes. Fifth and sixth prizes will be awarded on the basis of summer's activities as evidenced by manual and service record and report of all new members enrolled.

To be eligible for any of these worth-while prizes, a guard must be an active member in 1943. He must have his complete record for the summer in his manual and mail to Green Guard Headquarters, State Forestry Bldg., Salem, along with the names and addresses of any new members secured.

There will be 167 prizes to outstanding Green Guards, totaling more than \$500 in value, the county chairman pointed out, and all awards will be on the basis of points accumulated up to September 15. "Let's get busy, Green Guards, and win some of these prizes in this county," the KOG chairman urged the young junior forest wardens.

War bond officials announced at Portland that the state's third war loan drive quota of \$104,000,000 represented a 62.5 per cent increase, equivalent to \$112.50 for every employed person in Oregon.

HIGH SCHOOL COURSES ALLOW WAR TRAINING

Schedules are being arranged this week at the high school to allow seniors and juniors to take classes relating to war production and pre-induction training or some kind of specialized training.

Classes will be three hours in length and take five days a week. Some of the things that will be stressed will be radio, aviation sheet metal, gun, sheet metal, machine shop, auto mechanics and welding.

Maintenance and repair will be emphasized rather than the specialization of a certain subject. Army and navy officials have said that men who have been inducted recently have not had as much training as was previously believed. These courses are being designed to change this.

PART TIME CLASSES IN TRADES AT KUHS

Boys over 16 years of age who have employment may enter the trades and industries classes at the high school, providing their work is of such nature that lends itself to a part-time basis.

The usual schedule for this work is to carry on the regular school work in the morning and have the afternoon devoted entirely to the job. Schedules should be adjusted to conform with this as early as is convenient.

LeRoy Erdmann and Harold Teale will have charge of the work this year and schedules may be arranged with either of them. Two high school credits may be earned toward graduation in this work.

Just about any kind of part-time work will allow a boy to participate in this program. The school program includes related study with the occupation, reference reading, salesmanship, first aid, parliamentary procedure, trade terms, economics, and other subjects.

The non-rigid airship, the blimp, has been found ideal in the training of marine paratroopers as slow cruising speed provides an excellent "springboard."

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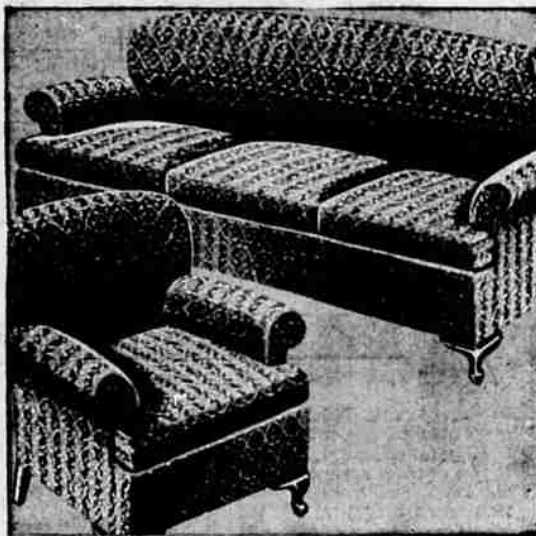
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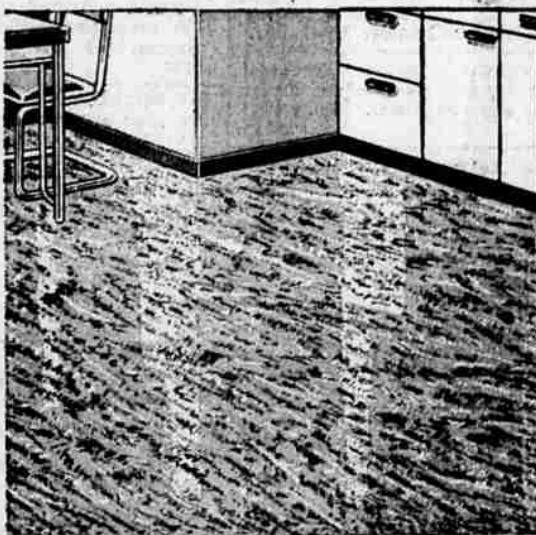


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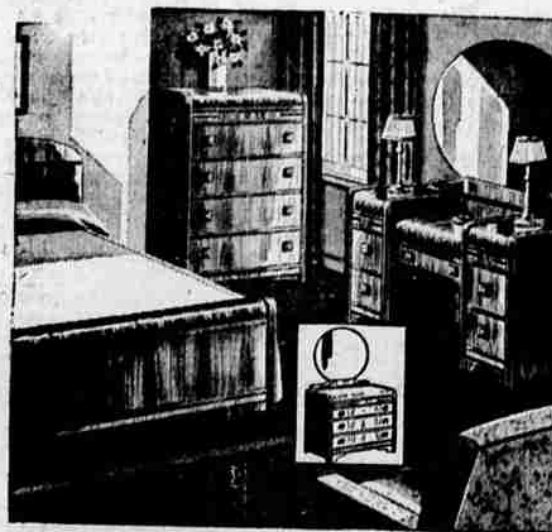


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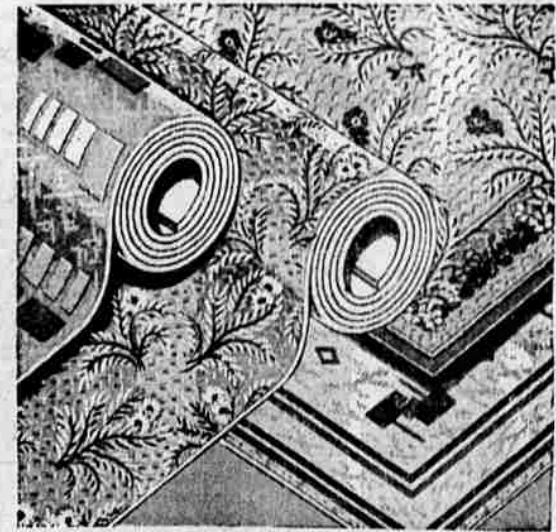
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
