

CONVENTION REPORT GIVEN BY DELEGATES

TULELAKE — Officers and delegates of the Tulelake Legion post and the auxiliary who were present at the state convention in San Francisco, August 16-18 inclusive, returned with reports of stirring, patriotic assemblies highlighted by few social activities but bearing the stamp of war-time intentness. Both the national commander, Roane Waring, and the president of the national auxiliary, Mrs. Ruth Mathabatt of California, were present, as well as Governor Earl Warren of California and other notables in both organizations.

During the auxiliary meeting, Mrs. Marvin Thomas, Tulelake, past president of the Tulelake auxiliary, was installed with 25 other district presidents. Mrs. Thomas will serve district No. 2. She expects to be returned to active service in the near future.
