NAZARENES TO HOLD CLOSING RALLY SERVICE

Sunday morning at 9:45 o'clock at the Church of the Nazarene will be the closing rally day service in a two-month series to increase attendance in the church school department. The series has been built around the military theme of "Unconditional Surrender," with each Sunday emphasizing some activity associated with military terminology. Sunday will be "Mustering In" Sunday when an attendance of 200 is expected.

Contesting sides, the army and the navy, have been led by "Lieutenant" Lafa Black and "Admiral" Ed Peterman. The losing side will be hosts at mess (banquet) in the near future with announced church school leaders of the district in the denomination present.

During the period over 200 New Testaments will have been distributed to workers and visitors at the school. Special valuable editions of the New Testament will be awarded for the boy and girl bringing the most people to the school for the series.

It is noted that despite the summer "slump," an increase of 100 per cent in attendance has prevailed for the two months just ending.
