TRUCKERS MAY ASK FOR HELP GETTING TIRES

Eligible truck operators, who hold tire rationing certificates but who are unable to locate within their county the proper tires, may apply to their nearest motor transport district office of the office of defense transportation for assistance; announced Jim H. Busch, ODT manager for the Medford district office.

This information will in turn be transmitted daily to the office of rubber director who will endeavor to arrange for the proper redistribution of tires so that all the certificates can be honored as quickly as possible after issuance.

This procedure was decided upon, the ODT stated, after some truck operators reported they were unable to obtain critically needed tires and as a result had to keep vehicles out of operation. In some cases it was reported that important war freight was delayed for this reason.

It is hoped that the new arrangement will help essential operators to obtain prompt relief, Busch stated.

Certificates Needed to Buy Adult Bicycles

Rationing certificates are now required for the purchase of adult bicycles because of the increase in demand and the curtailment of production, OPA said today.

The certificates are usually valid for 30 days, but boards are now allowed to extend the time to allow dealers to have time to order bikes for the consumer if necessary.

Children's bicycles and bicycles with a small front wheel to allow room for delivery baskets are unrationed, as are bicycle tires and tubes. There are ceilings on prices for the bikes, these being fixed at the highest price charged during March, 1942.

Negro Shipyard Worker Starts on Second Century

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 27 (AP)—A negro chipper at Kaiser's Vancouver shipyard started on what he said was his second century today.

He was Daniel Jones, who said he was born a slave at Dayville, Ala., August 26, 1843. Only slightly gray, he said he saw Gen. Robert E. Lee surrender at Appomattox courthouse.

Employment records give his age at 100, his home at Tallulah, La. He went to work at the shipyard last May.

Nine Escaped Nazis Retaken; Ten Free

KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 27 (AP)—Nineteen German prisoners escaped from the Fort Henry prison camp last night, but nine had been recaptured by 9 a. m. today and the remainder were hunted widely.

Four were found last night and five more were captured this morning, all in Kingston or nearby.

IMPROVEMENT OF ROAD IMPORTANT

MORO, Aug. 27 (AP)—Oregon's highway commission told Sherman county officials here yesterday that it considered improvement of the Columbia highway and Highway No. 97 of paramount importance in this section.

The commission, surveying possible postwar construction projects, heard requests at Condon for completion of the Heppner-Condon-Wasco secondary highway as the first project in that territory.

Judge James D. Burns said that construction of the proposed Cottonwood grade road would shorten the distance to The Dalles 27 miles and benefit farmers and businessmen alike.

Improvement of the Gilliam county section of the John Day highway to Arlington also was recommended, as well as offering of market roads in the county.

Dorothy McCullough Lee Resigns From State Senate

SALEM, Aug. 27 (AP)—State Senator Dorothy McCullough Lee, Portland republican, resigned from the senate Thursday because of her election Wednesday to the Portland city council.
