BRAZIL AIRLINER CRASH KILLS 18

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 27 (AP)—A three-motored Brazilian airliner struck a Naval Academy building in a takeoff from the Santos Dumont airport in a fog today and 18 of the 21 persons aboard, including the archbishop of Sao Paulo, Gaspar Afonseca Esilva, were killed.

No United States citizens were known to have been on the plane. The plane, a Junkers called "The City of Rio de Janeiro," struck the Naval Academy building with one wing. The plane broke in two, one part falling into the harbor. Fifteen were known dead. Three were missing. Three were hospitalized. One of the dead was Casper Libero, publisher of the Sao Paulo newspaper a Gazeta.

Turkish Motor Ship Gunned, Sunk

The Turkish motor vessel Dylmani, bearing timber from a Black Sea port to Istanbul, was machine-gunned and sunk by shellfire from an unidentified submarine Thursday near the Dardanelles strait, the Berlin radio said in a broadcast today. Quoting an Istanbul dispatch, it said the crew of six and five passengers aboard the craft were rescued. The broadcast was recorded by The Associated Press.

TEN NAZI SUBS SUNK IN AIR, SEA BATTLES

NEW YORK, Aug. 27 (AP)—At least 10 German U-boats were sunk or damaged recently in 13 air-sea battles between U. S. army air forces B-24 bombers patrolling far out into the ocean, the AAF's anti-submarine command announced today.

The command said five submarines were believed to have been sunk and five damaged, and three were forced under water and thereby prevented from attacking nearby allied shipping. None of these battles had been reported previously, the command added.

B-24's specially equipped for anti-submarine warfare flew far as 1000 miles from their home bases to battle the submarines, the command said, and all returned safely, although five of them were subjected to severe anti-aircraft fire from the U-boats.

"Five crew members in one plane were wounded when an explosive shell smashed through the nose," the command's formal statement read. "The same shell shattered flight instruments, the hydraulic system and other vital parts of the aircraft, but the pilot managed a safe landing at his base."

The statement did not say how many planes were involved in the fights and gave no dates. Hunters have been requested to give hunting knives with three inch or longer blades to men fighting in the South Pacific. Knives are so precious there that they sell for as much as \$50, and even they are unobtainable, according to members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, who are undertaking to gather knives and send them to men overseas.

Boxes are now placed in Moe's store and the Commando room, and Klamath residents are asked to place their name and address on a knife and put it in a box. Many men have sent home asking for knives that they have left behind, and many others have no place to write for knives. "Skin that buck with a jack knife, and let your hunting knife skin a Jap," said veterans, as they prepared for the drive to gather hunting knives for servicemen.
